intensely made-out before), but oddly enough everyone else can see her in the dreams. Even Kurosaki was saying that he wanted to kill that 'witch'.

It's kind of sad that Sou chose Ai when she had chained both herself and Mashiro on a crumbling bridge, but yet he ended up killing her, (or basically just killing a part of his imagination.)

Did killing his dream-version of his sister, (the black-dressed one) kill off the real one, (I assume the one dressed in white, but her wardrobe may have changed) or was that a complete coincidence? The storyline could really go either way.

The ending left me quite satisfied, (satisfied in a way like "I'm glad I kept reading, and I'm ready to read the next and last volume". If it has ended the series that way, I definitely wouldn't have been satisfied. I would have been PISSED.) [Excuse language]
