I received Undying Love as part of a Goodreads giveaway.

Meredith Reed, an architect, unexpectedly inherits her ancestral home, a sprawling historic plantation in rural Tennessee, when her grandmother passes away. Still reeling from a tremendous loss, she clashes with estate lawyer Max and her family in her efforts to raze the building and its bittersweet memories. But a series of curious happenings lead Meredith to research her own family history and discover long buried secrets that require a reckoning--and possibly a change of heart.

I was really intrigued by the "mystery" aspect of the story, much more than the romance, and I would have loved to see that thread developed more. It was haunting and horrific and a nice nod to the Southern gothic genre. I think this book could have been made a lot stronger as a general fiction novel focusing on the parallel relationships between the two sets of sisters, one during the Civil War and one in the modern day. There's a ton of possibility there. I also really enjoyed Meredith's character and would have liked to have experienced more of her backstory, particularly her grieving process.

The romance, as it was, fell flat for me. I didn't feel like there was enough development of Max and Meredith's relationship. I felt for Meredith (and agreed with her assessment that people were really pretty awful to her given what she'd gone through) and was really turned off by Max, who seemed intent on overpowering her--both physically and legally--at every opportunity. I would also have liked some development of the relationship between the Reed family members, particularly Meredith and Paulette. The latter was set up as a villain in the first part of the book, only for us to find out it was a simple misunderstanding which they quickly overcame despite a couple decades of estrangement. Additionally, the book seemed to imply there was some sort of horrific family drama that took place in/around the home (Meredith's paralyzing fear of the attic, for instance), but that didn't seem to be the case once her parents made an appearance. The personal relationship development could have been stronger in general I think.

That said, I enjoyed the change of pace (I don't normally read Southern-focused romance), and I very much thank Betty Boyle for signing my copy!
