*Deceived by a Duke*, #3 in Erin Knightley's *All's Fair in Love* series of clean novellas was a fun read. I read it as the first novella in the *Sweet Summer Kisses* collection of sweet Regencies.

Philip Dain, Duke of Gillingham, is in Seville, Spain with his younger brother Nigel in the hopes that a holiday together will set Nigel straight from the wild path he's been traversing since Nigel witnessed their father's death. They're travelling incognito as the Westbrook brothers. Philip's goal is that Nigel, temporarily partly stripped of the privileges of a duke's brother, will become more sober, in more ways than one.

Elizabeth Abbington, otherwise known as Libby, is travelling with her friend Lady Winters (Amelia) on Amelia's belated honeymoon with Lord Winters. (Until very recently, I would have thought this odd. But I learned in another Regency recently that it was common for a bride to bring a companion with her on her honeymoon.) Libby is in her element abroad, as she loves languages, and knows several.

Though Libby had never previously met the "Westbrook brothers," she steps in when she sees that Philip and Nigel are having difficulty communicating with a Spanish merchant.

What I liked:

\*I liked that Libby doesn't know Philip is a duke. I always think that's a good story line.

\*Philip is a very caring person, which makes for a strong hero.

What I didn't like:

\*While I'd still call this clean (for me), I think the use of language was unnecessary. (bollocks, Jesus, hell, etc.) (I usually see "deuce" rather than "hell" used in the Regency books I read.)

\*I did find a few errors, but I never am confident whether that's the fault of Kindle formatting.

I'd recommend this book for fans of Erin Knightley, clean Regency, and clean historical romance. I've read several of Knightley's books, my favorite so far being *The Baron Next Door*. I have put *All's Fair in Love* #4 on my to-read list.

Unfortunately their courtship was relegated to a meeting scene, a few chapters of a chaperoned excursion into the city, then a couple of sentences mentioning they had been spending a few hours together for the next two weeks. Considering the set-up for the story is the aloof duke finding the one woman he could be himself around I really wanted **more** of that time with them together.

The side story of Phillip rebuilding a relationship with his brother also suffered since we only see them at odds and then everything is fixed in one tender heart-to-heart. We also didn't get to hear too much about all the disappointments Libby experienced during her season or why she felt such an outsider within her own family. There was so much great material given in the initial scenes of the story that when the end came so quickly I was disappointed.

I did like how this ties into the other novellas in the series and it was nice to see or hear about the previous couples. I love Erin Knightley's books and I feel this story could have been better served as a full length so we could see the love blossoming rather than just knowing it was there.

While typically when I open a novella, I am not bothered by more limited character development and less

angst, this story suffered greatly because it was short.

Knightley sets up a lot of backstory at the beginning and then it is never resolved or was all patched up in a single scene. I like when there is less angst in a story, but in this case, it was highly unrealistic and dimmed my enjoyment significantly enough that the star rating was affected.

Now, despite the lack of wrap-up of backstory in the secondary characters, I thought the romance between Libby and Philip was lovely and complete. I could tell why they wanted to be together, see how they complemented one other, and would ultimately build a nice life together.
