But I had to throw in the proverbial towel when Seth stood over James while hand-feeding him his breakfast the morning after their first date.

Seth ended up being creepy, James came across as weak (even thought I'm fairly certain this was the exact opposite intention of the author), and the whole whole thing had a Harlequin romance novel circa 1985 vibe to it.

So, this book starts really well but somewhere along the line I could feel myself starting to cringe when the writing became overly melodramatic, with totally exaggerated responses and BDSM scenes that sounded more like a class than an actual scene. There were a few original bits (like the mention and super quick explanation of EDS) and I really enjoyed the playful aspect with different-colored arm-crutches.

There is nothing wrong with the book except too much melodrama in my opinion. There are many inconsistencies in the plot (e.g.: James supposedly has no money, thinks of himself as poor, yet he owns a 3-bedroom home with a studio for painting, a car, and doesn't seem to have any problems paying for his health expenses) and the characters are one-dimensional.

Some characters have the worst luck (whether in finding the right person, family issues, etc.), but James might rank up there at the top of the list with multiple ex's who were despicable and a family that should be shot for the evil things he endured either directly or through lack of support from them. It's a wonder that he didn't have more issues – such as being introverted or emotionally scarred. His physical and psychological issues were hard enough to read about, and yet, he showed enormous strength of character. It was easy to see why Seth felt compelled to protect James, but was equally amazed by his strength.

There were a lot of threads going on in the plot for this one. Given its novella length, a couple of threads

ended up a bit loose vs. being solidly woven into the story. For example, there is a hint of BDSM D/s elements here but they ended up feeling more awkward than central to the story. A little more of the back history on each character would have helped answer quite a few questions.

On the plus side, I enjoyed the portrayal of a strong character facing life challenges and coming out ahead. I enjoyed the supporting cast of characters and the concept that the family you make can be equally (or even more) important than the one you are born with. I enjoyed the support and encouragement Seth provided to James that helped him flourish. And, I enjoyed the spark between Seth and James.

There are no doubt going to be elements of this story that some people will really enjoy while others will dislike. As a whole, I enjoyed this story and thought it was a good first book from this author.

This story was actually kind of difficult for me to get through and I have to admit that I ended up skimming through a lot of it. It started off well, but then nothing really happened to make the story stand out. Nothing grabbed me, and there was very little substance to the story. There was no strong plot line that kept me wanted to turn the page to find out what would happen next. I didn't connect with the main characters as much as I usually do, and I just found it very difficult to get into and to keep going.

One thing that really bugged me was the use of pet names. It actually drove me crazy after a while, and I'm the kind of person who usually loves that sort of thing! I'm not one to complain over the occasional use of pet names. In fact, I usually encourage it. But seriously, "baby" and "pet" were really overused here to the point where I found myself rolling my eyes every time Seth used those words. And I've always disliked the term "pet" anyway, so that didn't help.

The story wasn't terrible but it was very slow and felt as if it lacked any real direction. It was very sweet, but maybe a little *too* sweet in places. There were a few scenes that felt rather contrived and certain parts just didn't feel particularly realistic. When I'm reading contemporary romance, I like a degree of realism. This didn't really have that.

Something that particularly confused me were the hints at BDSM. We were told about a past relationship where Seth had engaged in sexual practices that involved inflicted pain on his partner. The author also had James call Seth 'Sir' every so often and threw in words like "submissive" which all hinted at a BDSM theme, but then the author never really followed through on it. I'm not against BDSM at all (even if it's not something I read too often and even then I don't read anything too hardcore) but it would have been better either to leave that out completely or to have actually fully incorporated it into the story. It just ended up seeming random and out of place here.

To be fair, I'll outline a couple of things **I liked** about this book:

- Chase was an interesting secondary character and although he was a bit interfering, he was a great friend to James. I appreciated that. It was nice to see that James had a support system and that Chase was so protective of his friend. Okay, so there was one drunken scene where he was a bit of an idiot, but overall he was a good guy.

- I'll admit that Seth and James were cute together. It was overly sweet and corny at times (which elicited many eye rolls and snorts of laughter), but it was also very lovely too.

- James wasn't portrayed as the poor cripple or as someone who couldn't do anything for himself, and I liked that. I'm glad the author didn't portray James as being physically weak or incapable.

- The writing was good - not perfect, a few typos here and there, but still good.

- This isn't actually related to the story, but I love the cover. Seriously, it's stunning.

Overall, this book wasn't as good as I had hoped. It wasn't what I had expected after reading the blurb, either. I'm left feeling rather disappointed.

A "Live Your Life, Buy The Book" Review

James Bryant is an artist currently working in a design firm where his immediate boss constantly gives him a hard time and only gives James the jobs no-one else wants. When he gives James a new brief, he assumes it's more of the same, until his best friend and co-worker informs him that it's "not like most of the scraps Brian-the-dick tosses you." In fact, it's for a chain of hotels being developed that cater specifically for the GLBT community, and the CEO is hot!

When Seth first sees James he's instantly attracted to the man who, although suffering from a physical disability, refuses to let it define him. Seth wants James and is determined to get him. At their second business meeting on site of the first hotel, James runs into his ex, who's a part of the construction crew and has a panic attack as memories of his abusive past come flooding back. Seth calms him and reschedules James' presentation for later that afternoon. After the presentation, Seth makes his move, informing James that they are going to dinner, where he proceeds to order for James. A week later and Seth arrives at James' studio attached to the house. After the tour, Seth orders take-out for them (as he feels like Indian and doubts that James can make that) and the night ends in sex.

This is not so much an insta-love as it is an insta-relationship. There's no build up, no getting to know the

characters, no discussion before Bam! They're suddenly dating. As we learn later when he states that James is submissive, Seth is apparently kind of a Dom but his behaviour mostly comes across as overbearing, controlling and manipulative. Seth really needs to work on his communication skills. There's no discussion about a relationship, never mind any form of a BDSM one, yet Baby and Pet abound pretty much right from the start. It's like the author is forcing a fast connection between the MCs instead of letting it happen organically.

About a quarter of the way in, we learn that James actually has a genetic condition that contributed to the severity of his injuries sustained in an accident caused by his abusive ex. And that's how the majority of information is given – piecemeal and often in an almost throwaway fashion after the fact. I think that was one of the biggest reasons I had trouble feeling any connection to either character, their relationship or the story. So much of the information is either only hinted at or doled out later on with people from the MCs pasts suddenly cropping up out of the blue and other things glossed over, so it's really hard to understand the why of something. The narrative jumps all over the place, essentially answering the question before it's even asked thus putting the answer out of context.

There is absolutely no indication to gauge how much time has actually passed, not only from the beginning of the book to the end, but also from one scene to the next. To me, it only seems a matter of weeks, a few months at the most, but the characters talk and act as if it's been quite some time. The writing was a bit clunky – it's like chunks of the book had just been left out, the dialogue was often stilted and there was a lot of telling rather than showing. The sudden change from one scene to the next was very jarring. One minute we're in the middle of meet the parents and the next we're suddenly in a sex scene. I had to keep stopping and get my brain to change gears. I felt like the author was trying too hard with flowery descriptions like "his piercing blue orbs" and "his hungry, throbbing entrance" along with a fair bit of sugary sweetness.

The premise sounded lovely and I was hoping I would love this book. In the end, it just felt like the author was trying to cram too many different things into the book. BDSM elements, insta-love/relationship, tragic past, childhood abuse, a kid, evil grandparents suing for custody of said kid, abusive ex's (3 of them!), mystery, threats, a homophobic family and psychotic brother and mother. The result of which is all of those elects feeling underdeveloped.

Although I certainly have no objection to it, I'm not usually all that fussed on kids in romance books, but in this case it actually made things more interesting. I really liked Danni. She was definitely my favourite character. In fact, The extra half star is just for her. The cover is gorgeous.
