Hounded out of the funeral home after trying to pay his last respects to his foster mother, Jesse is devastated at her passing and not being able to explain that he didn't actually commit any crime that sent him to prison for nearly twenty years. He heads home fighting back tears only to be confronted by detectives Belkins and Montgomery.

The epitome of good cop/bad cop, Jesse knows the routine when stopped by them or any law enforcement officer; turn and face the wall, hide the wince as the handcuffs are clamped tightly around his wrists, wait to be frisked. And then answer the relentless questions, knowing the answers given won't be heard let alone believed.

From the questions and the error of not keeping his mouth shut, Jesse learns that his foster mother may have been murdered and he's the prime suspect. Disbelief that someone could have killed a woman dedicated to looking after 'lost' children, Jesse tries not get involved. The only problem is that someone wearing the same black and red plaid jacket was seen in the neighborhood of his foster parents. So naturally he's a suspect.

With only a few days to go before his probation is up at work which means he's with the union and has health insurance, Jesse needs to keep his head down. Unfortunately, with drug induced Aaron popping up where he lives making trouble, the odd goings on with the newly opened Tabernacle and its cat goddess plus his possible girlfriend a drunk and overreacting to a change in work procedures, Jesse is itching to 'investigate' the death but can he do so with out misfortune getting in the way?

Continuing on from Steeled For Murder, Jesse is still struggling with getting back on track. With detectives determined to find him guilty of something and the threat of going back to being monitored, he is even more

on tenterhooks about what he does and where he goes. The main characters are met again - Kelly, Aaron - as well as a few new ones such as Issac. Convinced he's a target, the likable convict finds himself tangled in web of mistrust, bad judgement and misunderstanding.

Another brilliant, gripping outing for Jesse. It's a fairly quick read but so absorbing and delivers a punch. I found myself wishing Jesse could catch a break. Despite staying out of trouble somehow it finds him; he has essentially a good heart and looks out for other people, even if it may mean getting into trouble himself. A riveting, engaging crime novel with a surprising ending. A highly recommended read.

Fostering Death picks up a little after book one left off. Though this book is one of those series where you don't necessarily have to have read the previous one to still enjoy the next book, there are some things that

just fit better if you have. So keep that in mind, there may be spoilers in number two if you haven't read the first one yet.

Jesse is back. What could be worse than all the drama and BS he suffered in his life? Finding out the one person who has ever cared about and believed in you has passed away. Then learning that the person was murdered and you are once again the prime suspect in a murder investigation, oh what fun for him. Add in some harassment, a cult, and some trouble in paradise, and you get *Fostering Death*.

Book two, had all the elements I enjoyed in book one. I still really like Jesse. And while he still has the worst luck for a decent person, he doesn't let it get him down. Yes, he feels it, but he doesn't just say screw it, fight back, and take the express lane back to prison. He's really trying to make this work, to make a life for himself even when no one but him trusts or believes in him 100% of the time. They kick him, but he gets right back up, determined not to be the person everyone thinks he is, but rather the one he knows he can be.

Even with his various struggles and interactions, including the Goddess Cat and her very interesting followers, it's not Jesse who stole my heart in this book. It's Kelly's kids. I've never wanted to crawl into a book and steal someone before, but I needed to rescue them, needed to help them. And that's one of the reasons I love this author's work. To me, reading is not just about passing time or being entertained. Depending on the story, it's an emotional/spiritual/etc. journey and a good book makes me want to be a part of it. Or, when it's not all happy ever afters, drags me into the pages kicking and screaming and forces me to feel. Forces me to learn something.

If you like mysteries with a hint of murder and a lot of character, then this series may be for you. I highly recommend this series. Lots of fun, some humor, and characters that will make you feel.
