## Simple Stories Ingo Schulze

Prize-winning German writer Ingo Schulze's first novel, **Simple Stories**, is a marvel of storytelling and craft. Set in the East German town of Altenburg after the fall of the Berlin Wall, it deftly leaps among an array of confused characters caught in the crossroads of their country's history: a lovelorn waitress who falls for a visiting West German investor; an art historian turned traveling salesman; a former Communist official plagued by his past; an unsuccessful writer who asks his neighbor to break his leg so that he can continue to live on welfare.

Schulze skillfully intercuts an assortment of moving and comic vignettes about seemingly unconnected people, gradually linking them into an exhilarating whole of tidal unity and emotional force, until we see that all the time we have been reading a novel in glittering fragments, spun by a master. With a piercing eye for detail and a magical ear for dialogue, Schulze portrays the tragi-comedy of ordinary people caught up in the last great historical upheaval of the century.

At the beginning of the book one might perhaps think that this is going to be a series of independent stories, with each chapter telling the tale of a different character - but that is not the case. Instead it is gradually revealed how all of the tales are carefully woven into each other, with characters meeting and talking about each other, bit by bit revealing how they're connected and detailing how the story of person A ends up influencing the story of person B. It's truly a very exciting read, as the full picture of the community is only gradually revealed to the reader, and the tiniest mention of an event in one of the early chapters might end up being a hint to the outcome of the story of another person who only gets his tale told towards the end! I loved almost every second of reading this book - even though I had to read it for uni ;)!

To allow that this book is rather amazing is not to say that I loved it. Taking into consideration the fact that it is a translation from the German, I had to work too hard to unravel the various tangled threads that weave through this convoluted tale of dislocation and shifting alliances. I'm sure a lot of the metaphors and allusions went right over my head.

At first I was delighted with the quaint table of contents and it was easy to spot the connections between the characters. In a way, it was like peering into a dolls house, observing the parallel lives. But as the number of characters proliferate, and events unfold in various time frames, it is necessary to begin each chapter, narrated from a different perspective, with a radical shift in POV. There is no central protagonist and the connections between these people, often extremely tenuous, are never clearly articulated.

The reader is put into a story without knowing anything about the characters or the plot. There isn't a real plot, it is as if there were many snapshots of common life of common people in East Germany. I thought it could have been interesting, but there isn't much in these stories. They are also interlinked because in a few stories we meet the same characters, but in a different moment of their lives, and this doesn't help, on the contrary, it's even more confusing because there is so little about the characters that it's nearly difficult to remember their names. I was also bored to death and didn't like the writing style, too minimalist.
