A little uneven, with insta-love and an ending that was mostly apparent about half-way through, this was a good first effort for a new author.

I liked Kerrigan's voice. She's a likable heroine, labeled as crazy because of her dreams and her reactions to them, even though she's not. I also very much liked the world the author built, and the plot that goes with it.

As an apocalyptic novel, this book shines. The author's writing flows very well, though it's a little uneven in certain spots, especially when it pertains to the budding romance (which seemed to be a little one-sided for a while), and when it comes to Kerrigan's reactions to her brother, and the revelations of what really happened.

What impressed me the most was the subtle exploration of nature versus nurture as well as fate versus choices. As Kerrigan learns the truth and is faced with being a key to the End of the World, these two topics play a very important role in the plot. Also explored are nuances of loyalty and friendship, lies and truth, and how someone might choose personal safety over the greater good, or at least seem to make that choice.

It's a fast read, especially for a book that is mostly about a journey. As I said in the beginning, the ending was clear from the moment the scrolls were explained, and though the "how" wasn't given away, the climax of the story was far from being a surprise.

Overall, the book gets three stars. The world-building and mysteries were well done. I could've done without the insta-love and without the self-aggrandizing behavior of Kerrigan's brother. He became almost a caricature, and while I probably wouldn't have liked him anyway, because of what he stood for and wanted to do, he ended up being rather one-dimensional and also incredibly stupid in the end.

A great first effort. I'd be interested in reading more by this author.

KINGDOM COME is a sweeping apocalyptic adventure colored with tragedy, longing, and hope, featuring a determined, brave heroine we can all root for. The pictures Michelle Smith painted won't leave my mind or my heart any time soon.

Kerrigan Monroe is crazy - or so she thinks. When the visions in her head become real, she realizes, along with her fellow mental hospital patients, that the apocalypse is now, brought on by a power-hungry brother she never knew she had. She is the only one who can open a scroll of death that will destroy everything except the people who have chosen to stand with a new leader.

KINGDOM COME doesn't mess around - it opens at the very beginning of a hellish apocalypse sweeping the entire planet. Even though it's largely a journey book, I wasn't bored or impatient at all - our heroes know where they're going and how soon they have to get there - the only thing they don't know is whether they will survive. That's because the fire and ice raining down from the sky are worse than anything you saw in the Hunger Games. Overexposed, sick, and wasting away, the group has to decide whether and how to keep going to the Southern compound that houses Kerrigan's brother.

This book explores incredibly nuanced issues of identity, fate, and destiny - must we do what we're born to do, or is it the way we were raised that matters? Kerrigan is a strong, loving, and thoughtful character, who believes in the inherent goodness of humanity and wants to save it. She continually rallies her friends to keep going. Most of all, she's brave, walking into danger time and time again.

But as the journey continues, the reader begins to doubt whether the instinct to save humanity is right - can they even handle themselves in the face of terror and tragedy? KINGDOM COME offered a realistic picture of the emotional consequences of such an upheaval - Smith shows us in-fighting, depression, exhaustion, bitterness, resentment, and even betrayal cropping up among our little group. The way Smith wrote these characters was so vivid that I really could picture each of them, and I felt like I was walking through the desolate landscape at their sides.

In the end, (no spoilers) there's what I thought was a perfect balance between interior and exterior factors driving Kerrigan's decision.

Definitely pick this up if you like apocalyptic stories full of grit and girl power (and, of course, a little bit of kissing.) Recommended!
