I found the writing too simple, stilted, and amateurish for my taste; it felt like a grade school paper. None of the characters grabbed my attention; our main character, Agatha, goes on about how her magic goes wrong and she has no control over the 'bigger' spells, then proceeds to 'teach' the FBI agents a lesson by using magic against them as easily as flipping a finger at a gnat and stating they had better treat a witch better than they did. Her familiar, a micro-unicorn she spelled years ago, is obnoxious rather than funny. Not to mention the cover art has nothing to do with the story (a full grown woman and a unicorn-Agatha was quite young when she spelled the unicorn). If I get a free next book I may read it to see if the writing improved, but I certainly won't go out of my way to find other books by this author.
