I haven't quite figured our protagonist out, and I would have liked to see more of his abilities in action. Hopefully this comes through in the next book. I also felt like I had missed a book somewhere before this. There was talk about things that had happened in the past, almost stated in a way that made it sound like a recap of events to me. I went back and checked to make sure that I was reading the first book in a series. Yep, I was. So this falls under the issue of telling the reader rather than showing, I think. I got this book in exchange for an honest review. Frankly, I'm quite pleased with it.

This story centers around Finn, a handler of all the paranormal things that we swear don't exist, and Amanda. There's a bit of romance between the two, but the story focuses mainly on Finn and his hometown, and the paranormal's obvious hatred of him. As we open the story, he's confronting a demon who promises to be there on the day of his demise and shows him the girl the demon claims will be his undoing. So Finn figures it's time for a return home.

It comes an explanation of the Fay, or fairies, who are nothing like the little winged creatures that giggle and fly around all happy and sparkly. They're far from nice, pretty twisted, and horribly ugly. And they hate Finn with a fiery passion. Interesting.

The return to Finn's home town brings an introduction to the town sheriff, Lyle. Lyle has been sheriff for about twenty years, and is the only person in the town that knows about the Fey. Apparently they have recently started abducting more people than normal. A larger scale plot is unveiled as a strange, beautiful and completely nude woman is spotted in connected with the Fey. There's a plot to finally destroy the town, which the girl is clearly at the head of. So Finn has to help combat the invading force of small blood thirsty creatures with an excessively small force.

All in all, this was a very interesting book and I'd love to read more in the series as it's released.

People are disappearing from Shallow Springs, the small town McCoy grew up in, and the sheriff grudgingly calls McCoy asking him to come back and help.

Paranormal thriller? Yes. It can also be described as horror as the Sluagh are nasty Fey creatures who want to take out the entire town and they are definitely not something you'd want to run into.

I have to say that I was pleasantly surprised with how well this self-published book was written, especially in comparison to all other self-published books I've read. There is a very well-rounded professional feel to it.

The story flows well, describing the various settings, the people involved, their thoughts, fears and actions with both good world and character building. I had to go back and look to see if credit is being given to an editor as it felt very much like I was reading a book that came out of a publishing house.

I really like the major characters and the fact that they are far from perfect. Finn, our main hero, is capable and determined, but in his forties his body is obviously not as agile and pain-free as it used to be. And his girlfriend, Amanda, has a vested interest in his safety and is more than willing and able to get in the middle of the action. She's also smart and able to offer up observations and suggestions that McCoy, in the middle of the "picture" can't always see.
