I figured almost immediately this wouldn't be one for me. First person, dual pov and the first character Camden is annoying. We learn he's clever - he reads Lord of the Rings, but his chaotic behaviour suggests otherwise.

It didn't get better, there's serious things thrown in there, Reid is guarding someone whose supposedly done bad things and seen traumatic things, which doesn't fit the bright breezy tone of the book; though the facts and consequences of such are ignored. I gather there's supposed to be some plot stuff going on but can't bring myself to care.

At 40% I was fed-up hearing how sweet, hot, clever Cam is while no-one acted or spoke naturally. It all felt silly and overblown to me, had zero connection.

Camden Lewis is a little down on his luck. His long-time boyfriend is an alcoholic, and borderline physically abusive, so Cam took off, first staying with his best friend, Miguel. But that only made Miguel's boyfriend upset, so he took a dump of an apartment he's about to get evicted from, if he can't get a commission soon in his new line of work: realty. He has one set of clients looking for a home, and one house listed for sale, and no new leads.

Reid Bishop was a US Marshal, but politics and problems drove him out of the service. He's been doing personal security, but that gig's about to dry up now that he let some C-List actor get swarmed at an outing. He's just about to take an extended leave to Kansas to investigate the house his great-uncle left him when his former boss calls with a personal favor. One of their trial witnesses is in jeopardy, and a leak in the Marshals service has them rattled. They want Reid to take the witness—a Vietnamese young man they are calling Lee—out of California and into a safe, unknown space. Kansas it is. Now, Reid and Lee are pretending to be boyfriends, because they are both gay, while Reid takes his time cleaning up his new property and preparing it for sale.

Cam's ecstatic about listing Reid's home, until he walks in. It's in a state of disrepair that ensures it won't sell fast enough for Cam to get a quick commission. Still, he's willing to give it a serious go, and even takes Reid up on an offer to work hourly to clear up the house. Lee isn't happy that Cam's around so much, because he sees how attracted Reid is to the lithe, upbeat man, and Cam feels awkward about his own

attraction to Reid.

They have some stellar missteps, like Reid and Lee meeting Cam in a most revealing way—stepping out of their shower. And there's strangeness afoot, with shadowy folks checking out the property, digging holes in the yard and breaking in. Reid's worried it's hitmen come for Lee, and nearly scares the pants off Cam and others as he totes that gun of his all around. Reid's jumpiness sets Cam's wheels a-turning. Are they really boyfriends on an extended leave? Or, are they criminals? Reid's attraction to Cam is hard to mistake. He's throwing out come-ons like they're going out of fashion. It's highly inappropriate, and Cam's confused by the mixed signals. That said, Cam's intrigued to investigate more, and almost afraid to get his heart's desire.

For me, this was a cute and sweet odd-couple romance. Reid's near-complacency regarding his and Lee's welfare didn't quite jibe with the clear and present danger they were in, so that was a miss for me, but the romance aspect was fun. The story was a bit of a caper, and reminded me of rom-coms that I've loved. Lee's a snot, and he learns some valuable lessons, as do all the characters. Cam learns to stand on his own feet, and respect himself, which was really awesome to see; he'd survived years of emotional abuse from his former partner. Reid's effusive compliments really help boost Cam's spirit, and Reid's time in Kansas limbo help him to sort out his own path—which doesn't seem to lie in security or law enforcement. There's a little bit of sexytimes, and they're yummy, too. Expect an HEA, and a lead-in to a sequel.

I was a bit bored by this.... I'll read Lee's story next. He's got to get together with Miguel of course.

This book was okay, but I never felt connected to either MC.

Reid has been put on leave from his personal security job, he cannot go back to being a Marshall. He is pretty sure he does not want to do protection work anymore, but what is he supposed to do then? Queu life limbo. Until, a job to watch a witness off the grid lands in his lap. (For some reason, he can't be trusted to guard celebs or witnesses in an official capacity, but off the grid without supervision or anyone to report to is just fine). So, he takes his charge to the house he just happened to have recently inherited to hide out until the hearing comes around.

Cam just cannot catch a break. He has recently left his rich, alcoholic, abusive boyfriend and is living in a tiny, run-down apartment. He is taking odd jobs to make ends meet (which they rarely do) as he tries to get his real estate business off the ground. He finally lands a big opportunity to sell a house for an owner who lives outside of town. He does some cringe worthy, unprofessional things and then meets Reid, the home owner, face-to-face in a way that eventually becomes a running joke between them.

What ensues is a story of convenient happenstance and some very light suspense. The story lacks a bit on the romance development as the two MCs spend half the book either not knowing each other or unable to spend any time getting to know each other due to Reid's job.

There is a bunch of time spent on Camden's friend, which feels like set up for future books. I'm fine with meeting characters for future books, but I want it to have an affect on the current storyline. Really, a lot of that was convoluted and made no sense for the story line. If we lifted out all the parts about Miguel and his boyfriend, the story would have been fine and not lacking anything except pages.

In the end, Cam and Reid figure it all out (both personal and professional). But the story as a whole was a bit meh. Not a whole lot of chemistry and light on suspense. And instead of focusing on other relationships and past relationships, a bit of focus on the two MCs, with more on page romance building would have gone a long way for me to feel invested in their relationship and future.

One of the most suspenseful parts of the book was the epilogue which sets us up (again, has no bearing on this particular story) for what I assume is the next book. That alone makes me want to read what comes next in this series.

Camden has the shittiest luck of all mankind. He is being evicted out of his crappy apartment after someone broke in and stole his father's baseball cards, his new job as a real estate agent is not going well, and his best friend's boyfriend is not happy with him crashing on their couch. He is only making money with his job as a singing hot dog these days. And now he has a crush on his one client, who has a live in boyfriend!

This book was fun! I really liked Camden and how he dealt with his terrible luck. I laughed my ass off when he was working as a hot dog and encountered some new clients. I don't think anyone expects to find their real estate agent working as a singing hot dog. :)

Because of all the secrets being kept I was a bit scared that this would be an angst read. But that wasn't the case! Camden and Reid do flirt a bit uncomfortably while Cam thinks Reid is still in a relationship (it was more Reid flirting and Camden putting a stop to that), but when something finally happens between them,

there are no more secrets. So that was good.

This book was definitely a fun read. It's not slapstick funny in any way, but I thought the parts with the sarcastic Lee were hilarious.

3.5 stars – Romantic suspense is a subgenre that I generally enjoy, though like most romance hybrids, I often have issues with how well the author of a given book does putting it together in a satisfying whole. *Full Disclosure* is my first exposure to author D.J. Jamison, and while I thought it was a good story overall and was satisfied by the relatively light suspense it contained, the romance left me wanting.

In spite of messing up his most recent assignment and being put on unpaid leave as a result, the boss of former U.S. marshal turned disgruntled bodyguard Reid Bishop tasks him with going off the grid to protect a key murder witness with a shady past. Having recently inherited a house in a small Kansas town, it's the perfect opportunity to earn unexpected pay while having time to consider his future and get the house ready to be sold, and since both he and the witness are gay, posing as a happy couple is the perfect cover. Or it would be if Camden Lewis, the real estate agent Reid had hired before moving, weren't so damned delicious in person. Struggling to build an independent life for himself after leaving his wealthy, alcoholic boyfriend, Camden really needs things to go smoothly and finally get his first sale, but the house needs a lot of work first. Since Camden could definitely use the cash, he offers to help Reid with some of the work.

Unfortunately, that means a lot more time needing to ignore his attraction to his taken client. But as strange things start happening around the house and between the two of them, Camden can't help but wonder what's going on. Reid admitting the truth might give him a chance to build something real with Camden, but with gangsters after the blood of his charge, Reid's honesty might come at a cost far too high to risk.

It is worth noting first that, in spite of the blurb being in the first person and present tense, *Full Disclosure* is told in alternating, first-person past tense. The storytelling style is generally light-hearted and engaging. In fact, though the first scene teeters on the verge of being cheesy, it does such a good job introducing Camden's character that I wanted to know more right away. As the story reveals the situation that brings Reid to Fields, Kansas, the set up for each character individually had me looking forward to how things would turn out for with both the suspense story line and the romantic one.

Fortunately, the two story lines intertwine well within this story. However, as is often the case in romance hybrids, there were times when some of the progression in each plot line felt rushed, particularly the process of Camden starting to question Reid's "relationship." I think this is the first time I've read a book containing a fake relationship that involves only one of the people in the book's romantic pairing. Because of the clear importance of keeping up the appearance of a real relationship, I was really looking for this to turn into a deliciously drawn-out slow burn caused by Reid's desire constantly waging war against his professionalism. Perhaps the constraints of writing a romance novel of "normal length" is what prevented this from being realized as well as I had hoped, but even taking that into consideration, a few of the crucial scenes that forwarded this process crossed the line into that of feeling contrived, and there were at least a couple of scenes that felt out of place in the book, as if something else needed to happen first.

By the time I finished the story, though, I was pleased with the suspense portion—though it needs to be noted, as befits the storytelling tone and style, this is not a nail-biting suspense. It is still satisfying as a light suspense. Unfortunately, the story felt light on the development of the romance, so that even though Camden and Reid get their happily ever after, I couldn't figure out what it was about either of them that made them perfect for the other. So as a result, I thought it was nice and a good read, but it failed to give me the intensity of feels that I long for in reading romance.

Despite the issues I had with it, I liked *Full Disclosure* overall. And that's a good thing because even though the author did well with making sure all the loose ends were tied up, the ending of the epilogue leaves a big question about what's next. This surprised me because I didn't realize it was part of a series. As such, I'm looking forward to the sequel.
