This novel was free on Amazon in November 2013, and with a title like The Pirate and the Puritan, I was hoping it would be good, campy fun, but it took itself pretty seriously. The heroine wasn't really as much of a puritan as the blurb made it sound, and the pirate naturally had a heart of gold. I'm generally a fan of non-virginal heroines, so the book had that in its favor, but it dealt a little simplistically with the race issues involved in the running of plantations in Barbados at the time. We know our main characters are good people because they're anti-slavery, and the hero has a black best friend, but the book still relegates the actual black characters to the background. The heroine does have to confront her assumptions about race at one point, and credit to the author for not romanticizing life in the Caribbean during the Atlantic slave trade. The best friend Samson and his son still felt a little bit like a plot device for telling us something about the hero and heroine rather than fully-fledged characters in their own right. I don't think I'll go back and re-read this the way I would a romance novel by Loretta Chase or Courtney Milan, but the plot held my attention, and I found myself wanting to know what was going to happen.
