This is such a happy easy read. I enjoyed seeing Susan and her Courtney's courtship. Her affection for chocolate and sweetmeats are only eventually replaced by her desire for his kisses. I also liked Jack and his Moll, their desire to go straight, and then their desire to be lazy villains again.

Robert Dangerfield is so masterful and full of arrogance. I like how Beaton uses that aristocratic trait of arrogance in her heroes. It is what makes them unable to accept that a woman could be cool towards them. Dangerfield is initially interested in Harriet for the simple reason that she is not interested in him as a man. She dismisses him and is happy in her spinsterish state.
