Agatha Raisin, the crusty, yet perversely self-conscious Londoner who has resettled in the ostensible calm of a Cotswold village stars in her seventh adventure by M.C. Beaton.

In this episode, Agatha has agreed to come out of retirement to manage the publicity for the launch of water bottled from a village spring - much to the chagrin of some of her neighbors. Worried that the commodification of at least part of the village's charm might wreak havoc on their peaceful existence, some of the community try to stop it once and for all.

Still, killing off a member of the village council and leaving the corpse in the spring itself seems a little extreme, especially as it makes Agatha's paying job a bit more difficult.

Believing that a dead body might destroy the chances for a successful campaign to market her product, Agatha begins an investigation into who might have wanted the victim dead.

Agatha Raisin continues to be an engaging and slightly puzzling heroine in 'The Wellspring of Death'. She careens around the Cotswolds asking impertinent questions regarding the personal lives of her neighbors, all the while wondering why so many of them are unpleasant to her. She manages to muddle her own romantic affairs to such an extent that she finds herself in bed with her young and handsome employer - to the dismay of her former fiancée.

Yet, in spite of all this, she engages in the occasional humorous assessment of what life among charming façades and lovely vistas is really like (crowded shopping in too small stores) and has a peculiarly British obsession with class and accent. There is much to appreciate here and little that is daunting or dismal. - K.A. Crouch

There's a pull quote on the cover that describes Agatha Raisin as "a glorious cross between Miss Marple and Lucille Ball, with a tad of pit bull tossed in."

Wild exaggeration, that.

Really, Agatha Raisin is a short-tempered semi-retired publicist who somehow overlooked the fact that she was still married when she tried to marry the guy next door to her new country cottage. She spends a lot of time worrying about that relationship, and also about the effects of aging. I'd have more sympathy with the latter, I'm sure, if I had ever spent a lot of time and effort on dolling myself up for display back when I *\*wasn't\** staring middle age in the face and going, "So?"

Ahem. There was also a mystery in there. She talks to a bunch of people, investigating it, most of whom are very or extremely rude. In the end, though, the mystery is solved by police analysis of some cat hair and coincidence. Boring, really, even though the nice wife of the parson wound up having to shoot the murderer.

So, nothing to see here, folks. Move along.

In the nearby village of Ancombe there is a spring which runs through a garden and then into a drinking fountain. When a company wants to bottle and sell the water the parish council members are divided about whether this is a good thing or a bad thing. Agatha Raisin is asked to do the PR for the company as she lives locally. When a member of the parish council is found dead in the spring things threaten to go pear shaped.

Naturally Agatha feels the need to get involved in the investigation into the murder and wonders whether this will be an opportunity for her to get on better terms again with her neighbour James Lacey. This is an amusing mystery with Agatha bumbling around in her usual fashion and uncovering things which may be relevant without realising their significance.

All the favourite series characters are here – Bill Wong whose love life is continually sabotaged by his parents; former colleague and friend, Roy Silver; the imperturbable and compassionate vicar's wife, Mrs Bloxby and the other villagers of Carsely. I found this entertaining and relaxing listening and Penelope Keith really does bring this audio book to life. It is her voice I hear when I read the books having listened to several of the audio books. The sound quality is excellent and this is light and easy listening.

First, she accepts a PR job for the water company and then she starts asking questions. As usual, she sticks her nose where it doesn't belong making everyone angry.

Still mooning over her former fiancé, James Lacey, she has an affair with a much younger man. James isn't quite as uninterested as he pretends to be. In fact, he decides to conduct his own investigation into the murder. It's almost a competition between James and Agatha as to who solves the crime first. Honestly, they both act like teenagers most of the time.

The mystery is another light-hearted one and it's easy to listen to. Once again, I'm more interested in the characters.
