I loved this volume, and it's been my favorite of this series so far. Willow is my favorite female character from Buffy, so I was glad to see her reappear, even if only for a short while. Faith's complicated thought process gets a glimpse, although she's clearly changed. I know not all fans feel this way, but I've always loved Connor as a character, so I loved the interaction between Father and Son. A part of me wishes they could be closer, but I know that Angel wants to keep Connor safe and to give him a chance to live a relatively normal, fulfilling life. Angel needs help from Willow, Willow needs help from Angel. In his quest to bring back Giles, Angel asks Willow to assist. Willow obliges, but in return, requests that Angel and Connor take her to the demon world where Connor grew up so that she can bring back a bit of magic to the post-magic world. The world, she contends, cannot go one without magic, since magic and hope are so closely linked.

Along with Faith, the four of them head to Connor's old stomping grounds, which are a horror to behold. However, the group learns that Connor was able to leave a glimpse into a different kind of life for the inhabitants.

The Angel & Faith graphic novels have become popular as they have surpassed the quality of the Buffy the Vampire Slayer comics. This volume has made it so clear to me that Angel & Faith is the only series I wish to follow at the moment. I'm putting down Buffy the Vampire Slayer comics and instead focusing on these as they are much more interesting and very well-written.

In this graphic novel we have some new (old) characters reappearing and I absolutely loved it. Willow is part of this whole volume, and so is Connor who is Angel's son (if you watched the show at all you know this, if not it's okay because they introduce his character really well. Gunn is along for a brief bit, as are two fantastic new characters from Giles' past (his aunties) who are immortal due to magic. They're hilarious and vain and I really liked that they continued from the last volume and seem to be regular characters now with Angel & Faith.

In a world without magic, Willow is desperate to recover it. To do so she needs to rip through to another dimension and gain her magic back. To do that she needs Connor, who is the only one with enough dark magic to rip open a portal to the dimension he spent 17 years in—fighting for his life in hell.

In a world without magic, Angel is desperate to recover the pieces of Giles' soul in an attempt to bring him back from his natural death.

These two plotlines are present in this volume — the Willow one is also seen in the Buffy comics. Willow and Angel work together (with Faith)

What I really liked about this volume was that it was written in such a way that a complete newbie to the series and the shows would be able to pick it up and understand it fully. Not only that, but actually enjoy it! I loved the action, humor, horror, and atmosphere. The drawings and style was impeccable.
