I received a copy of this book from the author via the Goodreads program Don't Buy My Love in exchange for an honest review.

It is with a heavy heart I have in writing this review. I really wanted to like this book: the blurb sounded like it was something right up my ally. I have read fantasy books in the past with elves and quests: writers such as C. Greenwood or Terry Brooks. I thought that I was getting that but with a m/m twist. Awesome. I thought. I began reading and boy was I lost and pretty much out of my element. The boxes in the book had me really worried that I had a damaged copy. I did

not know they are chat boxes with other people. I really was not aware Anders was in pixels. I haven't play video games since the Atari came out with Donkey Kong and Pac Man. I received a free copy of this book through the DBML program on GoodReads.

So first of all, I am not the target audience for this book. I don't read much fantasy, especially elves and fairy so on a quest. And I'm not really into video games. Especially ones where you wander around till you find something to fight. I do read M/M books and erotica, but usually ones focused on romance.

Reguardless, loved the book. The entire thing was delightfully ridiculous. The cover is gorgeous. We get the story from Anders' point of view - an elf character playing a MMPG who has lost his pants and must level up enough get some useable clothes. He needs to battle monsters and bosses to get points and find items to help him do this. Something has gone wrong in the game and most of the bosses want to take advantage of Anders' pantsless state. We get to know some other players through their use of comments in text boxes which adds to the authenticity.

I realized at about chapter 14 that I didn't know much about Anders outside of the game - what he looks like, how old he is, what real life responsibilities he had to deal with - but it didn't matter. The story is about the fantasy game.

Despite not being well versed in fantasy books or video games, I never felt lost or confused. I may have missed a couple of jokes, but even if I did, the book had a great sense of humor and Anders' list got funner to more items that got added to it. (I am going to start my own list.)

There is a lot of sex in this book and some of it was a little odd. I have a very fine line for dub-con/non-con

and there was once or twice I thought a boss battle might cross it, but it didn't. The sex was steamy and I enjoyed the creative use of in game abilities to enhance it.

I can easily say I've never read anything like this and I'm glad I did.

This book is...what can I say about this book? It's set in a video game world, where all the characters are avatars. Our hero, Anders, starts off as separate from his avatar, but gradually merges with his game character as the story progresses and he becomes more and more sucked into the alternate reality, something that is skillfully handled. The game setting is unusual, but many other things are standard portal-quest/epic fantasy, with the main character falling down a rabbit hole of sorts into another world, where he then spends the rest of the action traversing exotic and/or dangerous terrain, fighting monsters, and trying to achieve some quest aim, which in Anders's case includes finding a decent pair of pants. If you enjoy epic/portal-quest fantasy (as I do), you're likely to enjoy this aspect of the story (as I did); if you think that the hobbits spend way too much time on the road to Bree (and if so, what kind of a fantasy philistine are you?!), then you'll probably wish Anders could just level up, get some pants, and win the game already. That's up to you, but this story, for all its souffle-like lightness, has a definite epic background, which can be seen in its length and its multiple characters with multiple storylines.

So, the basics out of the way, all I can say is, while I hesitate to state that this the kinkiest thing I've ever read, it certainly makes top three, and it is one of the most exuberantly weird pieces of fiction I've ever read, but in a good way. Sort of like "A Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy," but with much, much more bizarre and graphic sex. Anders stumbles into a whole unexpected side of the game, one in which the game monsters want to use him as a sex toy rather than fight him. At first he panics, but then goes along for the ride, discovering amazing superpowers in the sex department on the way. In a book other than this one, Anders's predicament would be disturbing rather than amusing, as his consent in many of these encounters is sketchy or nonexistent, but somehow he always ends up on top (figuratively speaking; literally he's normally on the bottom), defeating the bad guys with his sAWESOME heinie (that's the word I'm going to use here, hehe) of holding and maybe finding love along the way.

If that's not enough, the different characters all have distinct voices, which is conveyed through the use of game text boxes (BTW, unless your Kindle is super-fancy, you're going to want to read this on a mobile device) and unique punctuation. The secondary characters also go on their own quests, involving much sexual confusion and gender-switching, when they're not arguing so hilariously via text box that at one point I actually cried with laughter. This book is not for everyone (e.g., those squeamish about graphic depictions of gay sex), but for those who want to read something a little bit (or a lot) different in the fantasy and erotica genres, I can't recommend it enough!

"In a genre as generally derivative as fantasy erotica, it's perilously difficult to find anything that stands out as truly unique, different or new. This book manages to feel like a genuinely refreshing experience, combining a sense of wit and style not often seen in modern fantasy writing.

If you're a fan of MMORPGs, you'll love this book for its wit and comedy alone. The adventures and quests are packed with monsters, all of who are out to indulge their carnal desires, to which our heroic elf protagonist meets with many predictably sticky outcomes.

Anders is our main character, an elf who comes across as particularly plucky and endearing, but surrounding him is a cast of colourful characters who are all equally developed and entertaining. If you're looking for something unique that was probably never done before, you've stopped at the right place. I've read many books in my life but never one quite like this one.

The premises of the book are a video game, but unlike the ones already out (series such as World of Warcraft or Magic the Gathering, just to name a few), the story happens through the avatars, inside the game. The dialogues are also special, being all done in chat boxes.

For those who ever played MMORPG games, you'll see a bit of yourself and maybe your friends in the book, minus the sexual parts of course. You'll recognize some of the problems you have when you start, such as not remembering the name of a city, or getting lost in the virtual world, or getting lagged to death, which leads to funny events.
