This one very pleasantly surprised me to say the least. Autumn Doughton's writing skills and character development were top-notch. There was perfect fluidity to this storyline with a realistic journey to substantiating a believable and meaningful relationship between Aimee and Cole. Wow. This book is one of the reasons why I just LOVE New Adult stories. I loved the characters, loved the plotline, loved the writing style!! I practically worship NA books that give me that *jolt,* that story that walks between the fine line of tragedy and love, and this book is the epitome of it all! From the beginning it was obvious that Aimee went through some serious shit, and there's nothing like a fascinating and mysterious prologue to get my attention.

“They want me to be like Mara. They want me to talk animatedly about hair products and get excited about recruitment fairs and parties and nail polish colors. Nobody wants to know about the nightmares or the rip tide of memories constantly trying to drag me under. The world doesn’t want to be forced to look at my scars.”

Aimee Spencer is a college freshman who, after experiencing a horrific ordeal, wants to just blend in with the crowd and live in the shadows. Her older sister, Mara, however, is the complete opposite of her, and after a few twists and turns, Aimee ends up hanging out with her crowd of people. A fateful incident literally crashes Aimee into Cole Everly, the college's most notorious man-whore. What I love about the setup of this story (besides the plot) is the dual POVs between Aimee and Cole. It's immensely gratifying to read about both of their thoughts and feelings when they're stuck in the same situation, and makes their connection even more electric.

"That first split-second of recognition hits me hard. It feels like an earthquake is trapped inside my body. My skin rumbles with the impact.

Power lines go down.

Trees are uprooted.

Homes are destroyed.

Cities are leveled."

Nope, it's not an exaggeration. Really, that's how powerful their bond is. It wasn't at first, and in the beginning, the book adopted a rather lighthearted tone but with an underlying sense of tragedy underneath. I love the book (and movie) name game Cole and Aimee play with each other. It warmed my heart to see that Aimee was willing to reach out to someone, and Cole was willing to make the effort to know someone, and the game as a meeting place, the middle ground where both of their efforts met.

"See? I know you, Aimee Spencer. I know you inside and out, and you know me. Shit. You're crammed so far under my skin that it's like my feelings can't even take one step without tripping over a part of you."

Cole is the definition of bad-boy-reformed, and though there were a few times he made some choices I didn't agree with, he is the perfect person for Aimee. He gets her. He understands her. He *knows* her. Once again, the dual POVs helped me realize just how much he needs her.

"Look but don't touch. That's the deal with us and it doesn't matter if I want more because I'm not going to touch her until she makes it clear that it's what she wants. And that's not a game. It's a promise. No more strategy. No more pushing. No more bullshit.

That was hard for me to digest and that set the tone for the reader as to his indifference and lack of commitment towards the heroine...

If the author really wanted the reader to believe in Cole's affirmation, he should have been "created" in a more convincing light as a hero with flaws but nevertheless being worthy of the heroine. I don't see a man who already has given a sense of indefinite commitment to a woman whom he developed feeling for and then in the moment of weakness allowing that weakness in the form of having casual sex with a stranger "as a man owning to the feelings he had for the heroine and the respect for her. It is ok to him to share in the most intimate moment with a stranger but not ok making an effort to strengthen his commitment towards a woman whom he has feelings for..or is he? The hero felt it was not right to have sex with someone, yet he allow it and after that the reader would expect an immediate reflection of remorse or guilt, but there was very little in the way of remorse...I was disappointed with the heroine's reaction to the revelation of his sexual escapade and she should go through the motions of keeping him at arms' length but she caved back to him just after hour of knowing and it was too quick, to soon and too easy. It was lyrical, poetic, so smooth, and flowed so naturally. There are some books where the writing tries too hard to be poetic, and you can feel that. Not here. Autumn Doughton's writing is impeccable. It's simple, yet complex; so lyrical, it just flows through you like liquid. God, I love writing like that. I love that natural talent in writing, to feel like the author's reaching out to you and communicating something important, something *real*. Autumn hit that spot-on, and I loved every second of it.

And if she wanted to, she could reach into my chest and rip my heart out of my body because it already belongs to her.

Ultimately, this is an incredibly real story of friendship, love, and moving on. It was pure, powerful, laugh-out-loud hilarious, and so genuine. I will absolutely be reading more from this author. Do yourself a favor and pick this book up today. Give it a read. You may find that it's exactly what you need right now.
