This is one of Jessica Steele's better books. It was so filled with WTF angst, I thought I was reading a Charlotte Lamb.

Kathryn is engaged to be married to Rex (first brother) when she happens to walk in and find him in bed with his secretary. She is devastated, breaks the engagement and runs off to be with her sister for the weekend. Rex on the other hand, recognizing the error of his ways, gets drunk and crashes the car seriously injuring himself.

In comes brother number 2, "The Other Brother". Of course, he has her pegged as one callous, mercenary bi#\$#@ who is just dumping his brother because she doesn't want to stick around for the recovery. Brother is the injured party. Brother can do no wrong. Brother shouts her name while suffering in the hospital. So second brother (poisoned by first brother) decides to take a little revenge on sweet Kathryn. Plan A: Get her to fall in love with him and then dump her sorry as#\$. Only this time second brother wants to leave her at the altar and give her the ultimate of humiliations.

This is where the story gets a little off track and why the heroine was really TSTL. First of all, she transfers her affection rather quickly to "Other Brother". She rationalizes her feelings as not having been in love with the first brother, but it still came off as fickle and cheapened her. Secondly, she continues to miss all the signs that he is setting her up...Harsh words, evil glances, hands choking her throat.

Luckily they decide to do the deed and alas he realizes since she was a virgin that everything his brother said was false. But too late, hero had his revenge and the heroine finally sees him for what he is. Of course, she continues to keep working for him, instead of walking out. Seems she feels some loyalty towards his predecessor. (Which I thought a bit absurd). She also goes to the 50th company reunion because she doesn't

want to hurt her other boss' feelings so she subjects herself to yet more of that wonderful Kingsbury charm. I kept scratching my head saying, really?

3 1/2 Stars ~ Growing up Kathryn knew her father had had affairs, and when her mother became ill and suddenly died, he had been off with one of his women. To further her resentment, only three months after her mother died, he remarried. Kathryn's sister Sandra has two young daughters and a husband who also has a roving eye. Time and again, Kathryn is consoling her sister over his affairs. Engaged to a wonderful young man, Kathryn is eagerly planning her wedding. It's a week before the day, and while moving some of her belongings over to her fiance's apartment, she finds him in bed with his secretary. Rex begs her to reconsider when she hands him her engagement ring, but infidelity is one thing Kathryn can never excuse. She heads off to her sister's for the weekend and when she returns on the Sunday, Rex's brother Nate comes pounding on her door. He demands to know where she's been and informs her that while she's been out having a good time, Rex has been seriously injured in a car accident. Nate assumes Kathryn will want to rush to Rex's side, but when he tells her that Rex's broken bones will mend in time, she tells Nate that she'd broken her engagement and she has no intentions of going to see Rex. This infuriates Nate, realizing that she's cold hearted and the cause for Rex's drinking binge that resulted in his reckless accident and so he plots revenge. He'll have Kathryn's heart and when she shows up at the church to marry him, he won't be there. But it all falls apart when he seduces her, discovers she's not the promiscuous bitch his brother had painted her, and then learns the whole story of his brother's infidelity. Horrified at how terribly he had treated Kathryn, Nate has a lot of crow to chew on to make things up to her.

This is one of those angsty little stories that has a plot that is so over the top but it sucks you in anyway and you find yourself compelled to read to the end. Kathryn has a generous trusting heart and a strong sense of loyalty to those she cares about. Never could she betray someone even if it was detrimental to her own well being. Once the shock of Rex's infidelity wears off, she quickly realizes that she'd never truly been in love with him and that his actions actually stopped them both from making a huge mistake. Nate, always close to his brother, could never imagine that he'd been lied to about Kathryn and seeing his brother rejected and in the hospital, he rages at the injustice. He's quite brutal in his treatment of Kathryn but I was rather proud of the way she stood up to him and made him eat the humiliation he meant for her. Ms. Steele loves to write heroines that are complete misjudged and wrongfully accused, and she does it quite well. This one's a page turner.

Kathryn is getting ready to marry Rex. She'll be moving into a much higher socio-economic bracket, but she's determined not to be a moocher, so she's paying for and organising a whole lot of wedding things. Her sweet old boss, Mr Kingsby, gives her the afternoon off to do wedding stuff. Rex is also a Kingsby. There are seven Kingsby men owning and running the company where Kathryn works. I don't know what the business does, but it's been doing it for a jubilee-worthy number of years. From what I can tell, they specialise in nepotism, the kind of bullying where the union really should be brought in, and occasionally soothing a cranky client. And working all hours. Whatever it is they do, it cannot be accomplished within a 40-hour work week.

So Kathryn decides to take some of her stuff over to Rex's flat, since he's ostensibly off doing the 'Whitaker contract.' Actually, he's in bed with his blonde secretary, Maxine. There isn't much point in me mentioning

Maxine's name, other than to point out that this is her one and only featuring role in the book. What happened to Maxine became my obsession. I mean, I know she was only there to destroy Kathryn's trust in Rex and devastate their wedding plans, but where did she go?

Kathryn let's Rex know that the wedding is off, and goes to see her sister. Kathryn's relationship with her sister is the sole reason this book gets three stars. It's wonderfully supportive. Sure, Kathryn's judgemental of her sister Sandra's relationship with Sandra's husband Victor, but she's never critical to Sandra's face, and she never offers unsolicited advice. These two support each other as a unit. When Kathryn tells her what Rex has done, Sandra says 'so the wedding's off, then?' She doesn't try to influence Kathryn's decision in any way. She just helps her with the practicalities of cancelling the arrangements. This was such a rare and precious and mature way to have a relationship with a family member. It would be worth five stars, except I started doing the maths on how awful the hero was, and had to subtract stars for his general level of horribleness, and his inability to grovel in an articulately satisfying manner.

Kathryn spends the weekend with her sister. She gets home to her London flat, and discovers that Rex has been in a car accident and is in hospital. He's out of critical, but he'll need a lengthy stay in hospital to recover from his injuries. He's been asking for her non-stop. Kathryn knows that it's all too raw for her to go and see him just yet.

This behaviour is completely, bafflingly vile to Rex's older brother, Nate. Nate is 37. He's been heading up the US part of the business (whatever it is), and is back for his brother's wedding, and for the vote to replace Kathryn's boss as chairman. Nate shows up on Kathryn's doorstep, accuses her of being with her lover all weekend, refuses to believe that she's been with her sister. He couldn't reach her, and knows exactly the kind of person she is. He will strangle her! He puts his hands around her throat, but manages to restrain himself from further physical violence.

What a prince, right? Kathryn's terrified, but does that awful thing where she distrusts her initial fears for her safety. Without explaining that she found Rex in bed with another woman (which is personal, anyway, and none of their damn business), she manages to convey to her boss, and to Nate, that the engagement is broken, and that she will not be visiting Rex in hospital. Her boss is prepared to accept that this is a personal matter, and because he values her work he extracts a promise from her that she will stay on with the company for at least three months, to assist the new chairman to transition into the role. Of course, the new chairman is Nate.

Kathryn's stated motivation for keeping Rex's cheating a secret is that she is certain this will be met with disbelief by the men in his family. She knows they will close ranks against her. She suspects reprisals. She's correct: even without offering an explanation, she's very definitely persona non grata. The Kingersbys give her the silent treatment.

I will get to Nate and his complete horribleness, but the silent treatment is also a plot failure. Kathryn observes it, is hurt by it, but it's a small detail. The thing is ... it's not. With only one exception, the senior and most powerful men in the company engage in bullying behaviour, and it has no effect on the way the other workers at the company treat Kathryn. Sure, Kathryn may spend the majority of her time with Chairman Nate, but there is simply no way that the other workers won't have seen how she's treated, and won't have engaged in some bullying of their own. This is human behaviour. Kathryn is a target. While I'm glad for her that Jessica Steele doesn't fully understand how office politics work, it was a frustrating misstep.

Anyway, Nate spends the first week being completely horrible to Kathryn at work, until he discovers her weakness. After that, he's nice as pie and she falls in love with him. Of course this is terribly naive of her, but she's vulnerable and gets a pass.

Nate displays the emotional intelligence of a bratty 8-year-old. He jumps to a great many conclusions about Kathryn, and spends zero time considering how his conclusions don't match his observations. His first impression is of a violent and abusive man, and since I've read this revenge plot before, I'm pretty comfortable with labelling him as a sociopath, as I read about how he turned charming and managed to seduce Kathryn into first admiring, and then loving him.

I'm not sure that it's fully established why Nate is so down on women. Possibly, it doesn't have to be: this world has clearly established rules where the Kingsby men have all the power. There's a family legend that they fall in love once and completely, that all their marriages are happy, loving and faithful ones. I don't trust that at all. Nate's entire motivation is believing that his brother has been wronged by a bad woman, and he's determined to be the one to make Kathryn pay. It's all very old testament. He's 13 years Kathryn's senior, and I can't rate him much lower as a human being, really.

Which meant that, when he got to his grand gesture of grovel, I still thought he was being incredibly controlling in his approach, and bad at articulating his feelings. He falls into that category of grabby, shouty heroes who can't talk about their feels, but have still, somehow, convinced a heroine that they make a good everlasting prospect.

Kathryn's whole deal is that she doesn't like cheaters, and when on the defensive she can get scrappy and say mean things. Apart from her blindly optimistic acceptance of Nate's volte-face, she seemed fairly smart. She certainly had confidence in her ability to organise and deal with detail, and she was endearingly lovely to her sister.

There's a lot of satisfaction in stories where the heroine suffers through great injustice and the hero, when her true goodness is revealed, grovels excessively. Still, this one missed the mark for me.

I am one of the few die hard Jessica Steele fans because I love reading about her urbane, bossy British alpha males in conservative Savile Row suits, with their stiff upper lips and other stiff parts too ! Lol. Ok, I shall behave ! This was one of my fav novels by this author because she amped up the angst and actually allowed her MC's to have sex too. Now that's a big deal for Jessica Steele since she's an author whose heroines always wait until after marriage before becoming *hymenally challenged*.

This heroine Kathryn, is, like too many of Jessica's soft English maidens, too self sacrificial. She protects her cheating fiance's reputation to avoid hurting his family's feelings. That bothered me a lot because these people are all adults and they deserved to know that Rex was a douche donkey cheater. Rex, Kathryn's cheating, rat bastard, dick of a secretary screwing fiance does NOT deserve her protection. At the beginning of the story, Kathryn walked in on Rex while he was banging the skanky secretary:

***For long seconds her stunned brain refused to think—the couple sharing the bed appearing to be similarly dumbstruck. For the man she hadn't expected to see until they were in church rehearsing their responses tomorrow just sat and stared too, his chest bare while his blonde companion—his secretary, Kathryn recognised—tried to cover up her naked breasts.***

Why does the heroine not tell his relatives the real reason she broke their engagement? Well, Rex was "traumatized" after Kathryn found him banging the *skanky* that he got drunk and was involved in a horrific car crash.

This is Rex just before the car crashes !

Kathryn the martyred maiden feels sorry for him and doesn't want to hurt his relatives with more bad news. I didn't agree with her. So what if the dickhead is in a coma with half his body in a plaster cast ? As far as I'm concerned, his meandering penis should have been broken too ! But, in HPlandia someone always has to pay the price for a tragedy and in this instance it's Kathryn who has to fork out the penance dollars. Some of Rex's relatives think she's a cold and brutal bitch for jilting him 2 days before the wedding. Her reputation shouldn't be maligned just because she feels the need to protect his goody two shoes image in the eyes of his super doting relatives. This is one of the things I can't stand: self sacrificial or martyr type heroines, especially when they're protecting people who don't deserve it.

This brings me to the big bad hero Nate. He was Rex's big brother and he decided it was his duty to seek vengeance for how Kathryn had "destroyed" his sibling's life. He was such a fucked up chameleon to the poor sweet h. He hid his evil intentions and pretended he cared for her in an effort to break her and embarrass her. Why did I like this novel then? Jessica Steele manages to portray the H's tormented feelings because he has a great longing for this woman he is supposed to loathe. The build up to the climax (pun intended ??? ) was interesting. The poor sweet heroine is slowly falling in real love with Nate. She realises that her feelings for the rat bastard Rex were not in any way as intense or meaningful as they are for his hunky older brother. She's in love for the first time, while the reader knows the H is just playing a game.

Yeah, for the poor sweet oblivious Kathryn, it's all about:

*Love is a many splendored thing  
It's the April rose that only grows in the early Spring  
Love is nature's way of giving a reason to be living  
The golden crown that makes a man a king  
Once on a high and windy hill, In the morning mist  
Two lovers kissed and the world stood still*

In fact, I'll even quote a few lines from that song since it's exactly how the H feels:

*Eye for an eye, tooth for a tooth  
A life for a life, it's my burden of proof  
Revenge, just for you  
Revenge  
You ask forgiveness, I give you sweet revenge*

Of course the climax to this revenge trope, is brought on by the sex scene. All Steele's heroines are virgins so our H sleeps with her, he discovers that his brother had been lying about certain things. It's perhaps the most apt use of virginity as a plot device. It might have taken a lot longer for Nate to realize the truth if Kathryn hadn't been a virgin. I know it's an old fashioned staple in the vintage harlequins but I guess it's the easiest

way for an author to solve a big problem. Kathryn was so in love with Nate that she broke her own rule about pre-marital sex and slept with him. She's filled with joy and bliss the morning after but the jackass H tells her that it was all for revenge. It was a painful scene to read:

*'Hello, darling,' she said softly instead, staying near the door. She saw Nate jerk at the sound of her voice, and thinking only to wait to see his face, to see his smile before she rushed into his arms, stood waiting for him to turn around. Strangely his hands were now clenched at his sides, she saw, but she shrugged aside whatever that might mean as she anticipated his loving smile as he began to turn. But there was no smile on his face as he turned to face her.*

Then it got worse:

*'Darling, what's wrong?' and heard none of the loving gentleness she had been expecting as he grated harshly:*

*'Why the hell didn't you tell me you were a virgin before I became too—involved to stop?'*

Only an old school British H would use a euphemistic term like *involved*, to describe passionate love making ! Then Nate bursts her romantic bubble by revealing the nasty truth about his vengeance scheme:

*'God!' Nate exploded. 'Can't you see why? Can't you see this whole mess is based on lies?'*

*'Lies?' she repeated, dumbfounded, too stunned by his attitude being so different from what she had thought it would be to take in what he was trying to tell her.*
