I was so excited when I learned about this book that I pre-ordered it even before it was released, and not because I have read any of the other "I Survived" books in this series (apparently this is book #14) but because this was about the eruption of Mt. Saint Helens. I lived near Mt. Saint Helens as a child and I experienced first hand this eruption. I saw it, I witnessed the mud flows and the destruction. Friends and classmates lost their homes as parts of my town were destroyed by the mud flow. This was real. So I was thrilled to see that this eruption was now being shared with a younger generation, many of whom are not even aware of Mt. Saint Helens and her devastation.

But in the end I am disappointed in this book. While I am happy that the main character in the story is a girl (apparently the main character in these books is usually a boy, and and the end the author tells why she made

a girl the lead this time), I was disappointed at how Jess, this 11 year old girl, was able to survive the eruption, survive in the blow down area, survive the PYROCLASTIC FLOW, by jumping in a hole with her friends and letting the eruptions hurricane winds and poisonous gas and ash blow over her with trees falling all around them. No, no, no. People DIED in this event. People 10 miles (and more) away from the mountain died, suffocated, were killed, and many were never recovered. If Jess and her friends were as close as the story tells, and were in the middle of the pyroclastic flow (a dense, destructive mass of very hot ash, lava fragments, and gases ejected explosively from a volcano and typically flowing downslope at great speed) she and her friends would be dead. I feel that the three of them surviving by jumping in a hole, and letting the eruption blow over them, doesn't do justice to those who really died and to the destruction that really happened.

The story also is centered around a "legend" of a character called Skeleton Woman, a legend that apparently is completely fictional to this story, as this is something that I have never heard of. For me, this side legend also detracted from the real event.

So while I will give the book a few stars for telling the younger generations about this eruption and mountain, I just so wish it would have been factual, and not this fictionalized and unrealistic story.
