The thing I enjoy about manga is the visual aspect. I love seeing it all laid out on the page for me. I think I've read enough of it at this point to form an opinion about the art. I like the art in this one. Sometimes the art in manga can become too "scratchy." That's the only word I can think of to describe it. This one is a little more defined. There's no rough edges. I like that and I've noticed that in Aihara's drawing in Honey Hunt as well.

As far as the plot and characters go, it's not as strong. I feel like there's this juggling act with all the boys in the series. Hatsumi never knows what or who she wants. She's so indecisive and she lets Ryoki walk all over her. I spent most of the series wishing she would stand up for herself or Ryoki would get a grip. It never occurred to me that their relationship was meant to be funny until the last volume. I never found it funny until the end, and I'm not sure that's a good thing. Azusa just wants revenge and toward the end I could honestly picture him standing over a girl tied to a railroad and twirling his mustache as he switched the tracks. Shinogu was the only character I truly liked. I mean, his situation was pretty messed up and weird, but I liked his character. He was caring and sincere and I felt sorry for him most of the time.

As far as the ending goes, it was pretty weak. Hatsumi and Ryoki have a pretty good ending, but I wish I could say that for the other two. I expected more out of the story for Azusa and Shinogu. I was unsatisfied by their lots. All in all, it was entertaining, but nothing special.

I really enjoyed this second omnibus volume to the series. The humor, the characters, the easy addicting quality of it, everything was there for me to fall in love with it as fast as I did the first time around. And while I adored this volume, I lot of it felt was setting for the third volume in this series. Maybe it's just me, but a lot of this volume in the series felt like set-up and/or development set-up. That's not to say it wasn't amazingly awesome, but I wasn't as impressed as I was the first time I got into this series.

So the plot was a mix of actually events happening, and, as I've previously stated, set-up for the next two omnibuses. The parts where things actually happened, and I was going OMGWHAT were great, and kept that suspense/addicting factor rolling as we get closer and closer to the truth behind the big conspiracy in this series. While I don't always love set-up, I have to admit the mangakan does a good job here in making her set-up also be about character development. Which is good, because this series really hinges on those absolutely honest, actual realistic characters.

Development wise, the changes in characters between the first and second volume of this series really showed how a lot of them are growing as people, and, in the case of a few of them at least, showing us how they are actually likable. Akane, for one, really became more of an actual character than just a useable plot point (like I felt she was in the first volume of Hot Gimmick). She pushed herself out of that typical hotter/more experienced younger sister role, and made herself into a character we can love, relate to, and cheer for.

Ryoki, however, was where I felt the mangakan decided to pursue the most change. As you've probably figured, for the most part in this series, Ryoki is kind of a sadistic bastard. He's mean and somewhat abusive to Hatsumi. But at the same time, he's obviously deeply in love with her, and remains conflicted between that caring adoration for Hatsumi, and the way he was raised. I won't spoil it for you, but Ryoki didn't get much love as a child-something I think messed him up quite a bit. Don't get me wrong, there's not a sudden change-redemption style-that turns Ryoki from a douche to a lovable nice guy, but that change, that beginning of change is there as he learns to be a better person and boyfriend through Hatsumi's influence.

Development people. That's the important part.

Hatsumi also kind of undergoes some change, though I find it more applicable in the third omnibus volume of this series, in that she gets more of a backbone, especially in relation to Ryoki, and starts to stand up for herself a lot more.

All in all, this second volume to the Hot Gimmick series was fun, crazily addicting, and beautiful to read and 'watch.' Wonderful art, complex characters, and a conspiracy-like plot, really what more can you ask for?
