I was pleased with the ending of this series. There continued to be more violence than I thought appropriate for upper elementary and even middle school, but the positive themes and characters of the books were paramount.

I also appreciated the Spirit Dogs throughout the books. While not religious, Lucky had heard stories about these benign forces of nature as a pup from his litter-mother, and called on them to help muster his strength to do difficult tasks. He questions their existence when events go against the dogs, but ultimately defeats the evil Blade of the Fierce Dogs, believing in himself and the forces of good.

Number six in the series, and the grand finale. Since the beginning we have been working towards the great battle between the Fierce dogs and the Wild Pack. Dogs have betrayed their own packs, been killed and deserted, but Lucky will be there at the end with his beloved Sweet and the pup Storm to see out the battle.

I'm not going to sugarcoat it, these books aren't as good as Warriors. The writing feels more childish, the culture of the dogs not as well defined. The characters are good, but Lucky is no Firestar. I never really understood key elements, like what exactly the Big Growl was. Obviously there was an earthquake, or an explosion? Or was there an earthquake that caused a power plant to melt down and cause toxic water and radiation? Is it the end of the world? I was never sure, because the entire story is told from a limited dog's understanding.

I do enjoy animal fiction, and I am glad I finally finished this series, with the exception of the short stories which I will read at a later date. I'm still not sure why they are so hard to get in Australia; has there been a publishing issue? I had to order this one direct from the US at the hefty price tag of \$35 for a hardcover. I kind of winced when I saw the total, but I couldn't wait any longer to add this book to my collection. They are seriously pretty covers, much like the Warriors books. Maybe I should try the Seekers books too? Four stars for the series as a whole, probably three and a half for this book.

The final battle is about to begin. Blade is set on destroying Storm, one of Lucky's pack. Will the Wild Pack survive this Storm of Dogs?

While I did somewhat enjoy arc 1 of Survivors, it ultimately ended in disappointment for me. I liked the earlier books, but the later ones just made me feel...underwhelmed.

First, the characters. I liked Lucky at first, back when he had some of his more arrogant attitude, because I like flawed characters. But, in the end, Lucky became the selfless, boring and bland hero we see in so many Erin Hunter stories. While he doesn't start out bland like someone like Firestar from the Warriors, he in the end does become one. The other characters I don't find very interesting, with Storm being the only one I remotely care about. The non-Lucky characters feel rather forgettable, and I couldn't bring myself to give a hoot about most of them. Sweet and Martha are like the only two others I kind of cared about but (view spoiler) The villains in this series I found boring. Blade feels boring, Terror feels boring, Blade's other pack members feel boring (except for Arrow I guess). I wish we could get a cool and epic backstory on these villains, something a lot of the villains in Warriors notoriously lack. But nope. Blade just has (view spoiler) That's like all of her backstory. She kills and supposedly is a big threat, but since I didn't care for the majority of the characters I didn't really feel it. I could care less if Mickey, Sunshine, Snap, Dart or most others died. Even if Lucky died I wouldn't care anymore. The characters are a big letdown.

The plot in this book is simply "defeat the bad guy". It would probably be okay if the villain was more interesting or there was any remote chance maybe our main character (or Storm) was going to die. But it was obvious Blade was going down before the final battle even begun.

The pacing was all right. The Survivors books in general have a nice pacing, so that's something I'll give them credit for.

Overall I just felt like this was a decent series. The climax had a nice setup, but I ended up disappointed in the end. (view spoiler)

If you want me to write here that it's a satisfying conclusion to the Survivors series, I'm sorry to disappoint. I liked the first few books, but in the end they ended up going downhill a bit, until finally resulting into this book. An overall (to me) meh book with a decent climax.

I'm not sure if I'll be reading arc 2. On the one hand, there is the possibility that things get better, and things do seem to focus on my favourite character, Storm. But on the other hand, I'm not so certain.

If you like dogs or Warriors or both and aren't bothered by the points I brought up in this review, I'd say maybe pick it up. But I still think arc 1 of Warriors, for all its flaws, is the superior series. Maybe I'm biased because of childhood nostalgia, I don't know. But I do think that Survivors arc 1 because of the declining quality in the last few books to me isn't really my thing.

In my epic endeavor to get caught up on Erin Hunter's books, I finally read Survivors: Storm of Dogs, which is the conclusion of the 1st series about the Wild Pack and our main character, Lucky. As usual, Hunter continues her streak of writing epic stories that I can't help but read in one go.

The best part about these books is the themes that she is able to impart using the medium of this pack of Wild Dogs. For instance, there has been a theme running through the entire series of busting stereotypes, mostly using the character of the Fierce Dog (Doberman Pincher), Storm. Pretty much all of the other dogs believe that because every other dog like her is vicious and mean that Storm will be too, although, she has shown on multiple occasions that she can control herself and isn't like the others of her breed. I think that this is a good lesson to teach kids (This is a middle-grade story) as a lot of them feel they have to be a certain way because everyone else is or because others like them are.
