THIS is what a cozy mystery is supposed to be! Fantastically done, and a debut novel, to boot! I can only expect even greater things from author Barbra Annino.

This book first came to my attention, and my Kindle app, when the blog "Pixel of Ink" listed it as a free selection. I 'bought' it but that didn't guarantee that I'd read it. What made me read it was the cover illustration. I know they say that you shouldn't judge a book by its cover, but it appeared to have the same cover stylings as another series of cozy mysteries that I really enjoyed: the "A High Heels Mystery" series by Gemma Halliday. And while I am on the subject of recommending cozy mystery series, let me also put in a plug for the "Jane Kelly" series by Nancy Bush.

So I judged a book by its cover and wasn't disappointed.

This is the story of a young sleuth named Stacy Justice who just so happens to have all the right connections, be in all the wrong places at the wrong time, and attract all the wrong attentions. In true cozy mystery fashion, you jump right in and necessary background is delivered in succinct way that a second book in a series does; the one where it says, "Remember when you learned this?" except that you haven't actually learned it.

Stacy is a reporter for her small town newspaper, but was helping out her cousin (and best friend?) in her bar when the bar catches on fire. This is where the story starts. It turns out that her cousin, Cinnamon, is Italian and has typical Italian family who love and feed Stacy. Then there is Leo, Stacy's boyfriend, who is Greek and the town's police chief. Add to that Stacy's other family: Her three elders in the form of grandmother Birdie, and great aunts Lolly and Fiona. The latter three are witches, as in real practicing wiccans who believe in using magic to gain clarity in a situation and encourage Stacy to do the same in the course of her investigative journalism. Stacy is hesitant, to say the least, about embracing this piece of her Celtic heritage and her skeptical-yet-witty commentary on the rituals she is forced to participate in make this a paranormal cozy with large appeal.

The story is fast paced with lots of twists and turns that keep you guessing. I had no fewer than three different perps in mind and it turned out to be none of them! Yikes! And the ending of the book is a cliff hanger, starting right in on the very next in the series. My wishlist now has a new entrant!

This story has many characteristics of the cozy mystery - the over-the-top characters, the mystery being investigated by someone not a part of the police force and the attempts by the culprit to keep the amateur investigator away from the case.

There is also a paranormal aspect in that Stacy, the main character, is a witch though she remembers none of her training and has no faith in it.

All of these elements added to an intriguing mystery should have created an enjoyable book. While for the most part it was ok, it fell down for me in a couple of places. The main character had a backstory that didn't seem to fit her character of today which created for me a bit of a disconnect as if the character was incomplete.

The actual plot also didn't resonate with me too much because there just seemed to be too many unanswered questions, inexplicable actions and illogical events that made the plot seem to me to lurch along in stops and starts instead of flow from one scene to another.

I have to admit that I did enjoy the parts of the story that contained Thor the Great Dane. He was my favorite character.

Spoiler Alert: While it would be possible to write a review without spoilers, it would be difficult to adequately explain why I disliked the story without providing the specific example I chose. So be aware that there is a spoiler in the 3rd paragraph below. I will hide in on the two sites that allow such (and as a result, it won't be accessible at all on my blog), but the rest of you? Sorry, but it's there. It's marked, though, although without formatting it might be hard to see.

My Thoughts: I had already picked up the first two books in this series when the third one came up for my Amazon Vine selection, so I was very excited to discover that, since the books sounded like something I would like and this would save me having to track that third one down. This is the first book in the Stacy Justice series, followed by *Bloodstone* and *Tiger's Eye*. A fourth book, *Emerald Isle*, is scheduled for release sometime in 2013.

I sort of went back and forth on my feelings on this book. I would be enjoying it for what it was, but then I'd

stop and think about it and have all kinds of issues with it, which are mostly personal issues about not caring much for “chick lit”. I also kept wanting to compare it to *Practical Magic* because the Geraghty Girls reminded me of the aunties. But when it came right down to it, and despite how much I loved *Practical Magic*, I really didn't like the story.

The reason has to do with the reasons I don't much care for chick lit or many romances, and that is that too many authors think that “feisty” translates into a complete inability to deal with things rationally. (view spoiler) What on earth is WRONG with these people? “Oh, screw you for saving my life, how dare you do that!” That isn't “feisty”, that's “too stupid to live.” There is a major difference between being self-sufficient, and being reckless and stubborn, and all too often the women in these sorts of books are just stupidly reckless and stubborn.

If it weren't for the fact that a) I need to read the series because the third one is a Vine book and b) there is a twist at the very end that makes me hopeful the next book will be better, I'd just abandon this whole thing. However, if you like chick lit, if you like paranormal romances, if you like those sorts of stories, you will probably like this one, so don't let my grumpiness turn you off it.

Opal Fire: A Stacy Justice Mystery (Volume I) by Barbra Annino is a cozy mystery with a side of paranormal and a chick lit twist. I would recommend it to anyone who enjoys a fast-paced, fun novel full of quirky characters and sprinkled with humor.

The book opens with a devastating fire at the Black Opal, the bar owned by Stacy Justice's cousin. When the insurance adjuster won't pay the claim because he insists it's arson, Stacy gets to work. Along with using her inside connections on the police force (her boyfriend is the chief), Stacy also finally, albeit clumsily, embraces her family's gift, witchcraft. While investigating the fire, she discovers a far more serious secret

buried in the rubble that ends up putting her own life in jeopardy. Exploding chickens and other antics ensue.

In case you can't tell from the exploding chickens reference, this is a book that never takes itself too seriously -- lots more humorous situations as well as quips throughout -- but it never loses sight of the importance of moving along the plot and character development.

Going into this, I knew I could either really fall into the story and characters or just find it kind of silly and get bored quickly; it was all up to the writer and execution -- and Annino pulled it off. Beautifully. There's an air of Janet Evanovich and Stephanie Plum in there, so if you like that series, I'd strongly suggest giving Annino's Stacy Justice mysteries a try.
