So the new villains, looks like is a similar grouping as the ninja group from first series, or the seven swords from Shishio, but this time they want revenge on Kenshin for something, so they attack Akabeko just to let Kenshin know they are there and to warn him that in 10 days they will take vengeance, so when finally all are at the Kamiya dojo Kenshin tells them who the mysterious Enishi is and tells the story of how he became Battosai, how he knew Enishi's sister and while needing to wait in hiding lived with her as husband and wife finally finding what was a happy life, about the tragic event that led to Enishi's sister being killed that being the reason for the attack, then they set to prepare for the attack, the final pages are the group arriving and making the first attack with a man with a cannon in his arm that is easily defeated.

This is 3 1/2 stars, but I round up. Literally almost nothing happens for Jinchu and then bam we get started only to stop. This was basically Samurai X the movie. You want to know what's crazy, I've never seen the movie, up until a week ago that is. Weird how those coincidences happen...I believe the Germans have a word for it. Anyway, not much I'm going to write here.

We learn the history to Battosai, the dark side to Kenshin is revealed. I think that the movie is definitely better in this regard. It's a lot darker and it doesn't leave any room for some of the foolishness Watsuki throws in (which is gold and I love it, but Kenshin's past needed to be told in a very grim and serious manner). His usual themes, like his slapstick humor, kind of clash with Kenshin's past. I still think it was good, I just divert to the movie in this one.

Because let's be real as far as the overall plot is concerned 1 day took up 100 something pages and then 8 days pass in less than two pages. It's kind of weird, but ultimately a huge build up for the clash between Enishi and Kenshin, there is a lot riding on this one. We'll see in the next volume!
