I miss Ordinary Boy. As far as creativity goes, Melvin's up there with Ordinary Boy: Melvin's a recently graduated superhero who always needs five or six tries before he manages to fly and has a weakness for bologna (instead of kryptonite). Even better (for me), he's assigned to Los Angeles. What's not to like? Well, for one, the book is an easy reader (Amazon lists the reading level ages as 9 to 12, but I would say that 6 / 7 to 9 is more accurate): in other words, it's not one of those children's books that most adults (at least me) want to read. The funny thing is, there's enough plot and detail that the story would have been better served as a fully fleshed-out novel. As it is, there's too much packed into such a short book - what I remember loving about those first "read alone novels" was how simple and straightforward they were without too much information. The simple plot made it easy to focus on learning to read. With Melvin, I came away feeling like this would not be a book I'd recommend to children at that early stage of solo reading. But given the creativity, I would recommend it for children who are about to make the leap to actual novels.

Recent graduate from Superhero Academy, Melvin Beederman is assigned to the city of Los Angeles... a city who needs a superhero in the worst way. While Melvin can't quite lead tall buildings in a single bound (it takes a couple of tries) or stop a speeding locomotive (it takes him a little while) he knows that what sets him apart is his brain power.

Full of the 2nd and 3rd grade boy jokes that include the burden of x-ray vision and adult's underwear, bologna sandwiches, and general silliness this is one that appeal the young guy who likes his superhero, loves to laugh, and likes a fast paced story. The sprinkling of illustrations and recurring pattern of storytelling makes this a great first "chapter book" beyond those leveled readers.

Tons of Fun! That's what the Melvin Beederman Superhero books are! They are simple chapter books about Melvin Beederman, the top graduate in his Superhero Academy class. Orphaned when his math-genius father was killed in a speeding train word problem accident, Headmaster Spinner spotted Melvin in the orphanage, recognizes his special abilities and takes him to live at the Superhero Academy.

As we begin the first book in the Melvin Beederman series, Melvin has just accepted his first superhero assignment in Los Angeles, California. They are in desperate need of a superhero and Melvin gets off to a great start. Unfortunately, a rescue at a tractor pull causes Melvin to part with his superhero cape temporarily at the same time the McNasty brothers ("bank robbers and all-around bad guys") break out of jail.

Alas, when Melvin and his cape are reunited things do not work out the way Melvin was expecting. Melvin knows what his weakness is: bologna. What they do NOT teach you at the Academy is how to defeat your weakness. Melvin's special gifts—the ones that exceed mere superpowers—are the key to discovering his true

strength.

This is a great read-aloud for 1st -3rd graders (1st graders at the END of the school year)! My 8 and 9 year old and I had a blast reading it as a bedtime story! Rhode Montijo's cartoonish superhero illustrations are the perfect accompaniment to a story with a good heart and a little tongue-in-cheek humor that even the kids get!

This one is fun to read WITH a young person!

In this episode, Melvin's cape comes back shrunk from the cleaners and his powers have evaporated. Meanwhile, a girl in a play finds her cape has grown twice its size... and she suddenly can move very fast (and has an aversion to bologna).

The "pilot" episode was very entertaining, and it acts as a kind of coming-of-age story as Melvin tries to find his place/purpose. A lot of classic superhero tropes are introduced, but definitely tongue-in-cheek the whole time. The laundromat dilemma is inspired.

Series impressions: Clever and funny, very relatable for kids who want to be superheroes. I like that his sidekick is an African American girl, although I was not pleased that she has trouble in math, and it is Melvin that has to solve their problems with "noggin' power." Still, she has superhero powers, can fly more easily than Melvin, and the two have entertaining interactions. Bonus: contains occasional subtle humor for any adults who may be narrating.who may be narrating.

I think it's good entertaining reading for young boys. There isn't an AR level for this one that I could find, but I would guess it's probably a 2nd grade level. Also, there are six or seven books in the series, so once you get your kid to read the first one, they'll probably want to read the rest, too.

Melvin is a super hero who has some trouble with his super powers. It takes him a little longer to launch into flight, it takes him longer to stop trains, and he isn't fond of his x ray vision, because he gets tired of seeing underwear! His one undoing-- if he is around bologna, he is weakened. Other super heroes give him a hard time. When aspiring actress Candace takes her cape to the cleaners at the same time Melvin does, the two get the wrong cape, and Candace gets some of Melvin's powers. Eventually, the two meet up and are able to change capes and decide to be partners in UNcrime.

Strengths: Many of my reluctant readers LOVE superheroes books. These are a great length, similar to Captain Underpants in their ratio of words to pictures, and on a fairly easy reading level. There are eight books in the series so far, so this will keep them reading for a bit.

Weaknesses: Not quite as funny and clever as Captain Underpants, and while the illustrations might be more attractive than those, they also look very computer generated.

What I really think: The downside of telling your students that you have read all of the fiction books in the school library is that if you buy seven books in the series, you have to READ seven books in the series.

(Book 8 did not come in this shipment. Hmmm.)
