The first issue turned me off significantly. There was no substance to it, just a series of "read this in this issue" plot threads. I couldn't be bothered to read all of issue 2. Just no.

If you believe Marvel Comics mishandled the death (and origin story) of Wolverine, get ready for the aftermath. For those who felt it couldn't get worse, all I have to say is: HA!

Soule, who penned Wolverine's controversial (read: sucky) death story, here bookended this volume with a plotline about how most of Marvel's character's most closely related to Wolverine are now trapped together in an impenetrable cage (literally and if you choose to think about it, metaphorically too. I choose not to think along these lines. It hurts my head too much!). If you were hoping for a cage match to the death between the participants, I'm sorry to say it's not happening.

Apparently, Sabretooth, X-23, Lady Deathstrike, Mystique and Daken (and Elixer) have been captured by creations of the guy who originally helped these Wolverine-ites get started on the road to pain and mayhem.

It seems that they were each programmed (unbeknownst to comic readers) with four unique code words, if uttered by the handler, do one of four things, including have them die and obey any command (Sit Sabretooth! Good boy! Here's a treat!). This is a set-up for an issue about each and how the death of Wolverine has affected them.

Each participant is either somehow transformed by Wolverine's legacy or is stuck in their own cycle of torment. Their mileage (as well as yours) may vary.

*How's it hanging, fellas?*

The stories themselves, none thankfully written by Soule, range in quality from "so what" to "this might just work". The art varies as well, and if you like tinted and obscure comic panels, you'll absolutely love the Sabretooth book. Heh!

From here, this is what you have to look forward to in the “Wolverine is taking a dirt nap, thanks” saga.

Continuing from the Weapon X book I read this weekend, the story of the people all affected by Wolverine's death deal with it in their own ways. It's an interesting concept that I will be digging more into.

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### **Sam Quixote says**

Usually the rule is that the event comic is a pile of crap while some of the tie-ins are surprisingly decent, even good. I'm not sure about the other spinoffs but The Logan Legacy tie-in to the Death of Wolverine

manages to be even worse than the underwhelming main event.

X-23, Daken (when did he come back from the dead?), Sabretooth, Lady Deathstrike and Mystique - all characters tied to Wolverine in different ways - are somehow lured to some castle in Croatia where they're held captive. They're told by a mysterious stranger that Dr Abraham Cornelius, the guy behind the Weapon X programme, experimented on them too, implanting four trigger words in their brains.

The first puts them to sleep, the second puts them into a suggestive trance, the third kills them, and the fourth... is unknown. The stranger stands around their cage while they each tell a single-issue story about what they did when they heard Wolverine was dead. There are contrived thin plots - and then there's The Logan Legacy.

Charles Soule writes the first setup issue and the concluding chapter while Tim Seeley writes X-23's story, Kyle Higgins writes Sabretooth, Marguerite Bennett writes Lady Deathstrike, Ray Fawkes writes Daken, and James Tynion IV writes Mystique. Soule's writing is unusually spotty but, given the useless premise, he really has nothing to work with. The others, if you're familiar with their work, are hardly A-list talents and produce sub-standard comics in this volume.

This whole book screams gratuitous cash-in and an extremely lazy one at that. None of the stories are worth reading at all. X-23 cries, fights some people, then gets over Wolverine's death. Sabretooth is so fucked in the head he just keeps killing people he believes are Wolverine. Lady Deathstrike kills gangsters, Daken kills gangsters, Mystique kills some SHIELD personnel - all of it adding up to one big zero.

I was crying out for anything: some variation in the stories, a little imagination, a clever scene - but no, it's just these characters doing what they're always doing in the most sober tone possible. X-23 is in an even skimpier outfit than usual and Daken's new look is even gayer than when he kissed his ex-boyfriend.

The art feels rushed, the writing is dreary filler, and the book is needless preamble to Wolverines - skip, skip, skip, skip this pointless shit! However given that the majority of Wolverine's solo books were terrible, The Logan Legacy is indeed a fitting legacy to the character.

Logan legacy is for the most part good - I confess I wasn't a fan of the story narrative of 'forming a super-team' by bringing several characters together (i.e. those shown on the cover) for one episode, and then flashing back to their individual storylines before coming back to the overarching plot. It's probably not a big deal but I always get annoyed in comics with the endless to be continued, hence the reason I tend to wait a while and buy collected series like this.

In terms of the individual tales, Sabre-tooth's is creepy as, Daken is interesting, and Mystique is suitably

mysterious. X-23 story started and ended well but I felt had the wrong balance of humour and action in her story. Yukio was interesting on paper but the artwork was as confusing as it was epic weakening the tale in my opinion.

This book made me feel pretty angry because of so many reasons.... To start with you should know this was originally 7 comics...

Issue 1 Tell me if this plot sounds familiar. A group of people are dropped into a jail cell, and can't get out... And they all have something in common.

Through that you get 1 panel that describes the last thing they did before being jailed, and an ad for the issue that fully describes that story ie: read issue 4 to find out more about mystique. You can just skip issues 2-6 and go back to the story in issue 7 which is just a jumping off point to the next sell "the Wolverines". So all 7 issues are just a sell for the next series. Just awful.

Issues 2-6 are very short stories about how the characters X-23, Sabertooth, Mystique, Lady Death Strike, and wolverine's Son react to the news of Wolverines "death". The stories are so basic that you can describe them in about 2 sentences.

So if you have to read it for continuity, don't expect to get much out of this. If you can get it for free from the library please go that route, and don't waist any money on it.

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
