When Blaine initiates contact with Covey, Blaine waves his gun at him. Hampton then gets out of the truck, not to fight Covey, but to control Blaine, which was much needed for a long time. After the fight incident with Blaine and Hampton, Hampton explains to Sara what all happened, and they continue to proceed with their walk in the country. The book then ends abruptly with many questions, and hopefulness for a sequel.

Characterization:
