Mia and Ashur are back with a bang. Their romance has been fraught with danger, intrigue and deception but somehow they still manage to find time to fall in love. Omari is settling in well with the Dragon Skein and Mia is content, but she knows danger is on the horizon as her father will not stop until he has eradicated her.

Ashur continues to have heart attacks when Mia is caught in the crossfire but they finally have enough and decide to take the fight to Emberich. But will they rally enough troops to take on Emberich? Are their new allies really on their side or plants to learn of their movements and plans?

Mia continues to have trouble finding her. She is the target of several attacks and even though her grandmother isn't keen she decides to take on her father. Ashur is the perfect mix of Alpha male and supportive partner, even when he does have kittens every time she gets hurt! Great ending to the story arc but I wanna know what happens to Omari!

I received an ARC edition of this book from the author.

This ended up being a good finish to the trilogy. It tied up a lot of the loose ends, but left plenty of room for future books in this universe. The action was nicely paced and there didn't feel like there was over-the-top drama (just what you expect for a massive conflict).

I was a little disappointed that Jacob didn't make an appearance in this book. Although he was a secondary character, I felt he had played a significant role in the previous book so I was expecting something as this is the trilogy end.

Burned Brightly, too fast

I sped through the first two books, largely enjoying myself and overlooking issues because I was genuinely into the world.

This book though felt like all those issues magnified.

The pacing was a mess - towards the middle it was one lucky stroke after another, each time with Mia thinking that it might just be what they needed. A neutral skein is attacked - they all join the fight now. Dragons defect from their cowardly leaders - that's more dragons added to the fight. The refugees the skeins brought in - well EVEN MORE allies. Mia's bat-crazy father makes several moves that are stupid, overreaching and guaranteed to piss people off - guess what guys MORE ALLIES.

It took all of the tension out of the novel. We started the novel with several characters cautioning Mia that her jerkface father was just TOO powerful and had TOO MANY fighters on his side. But every new scene saw that chipped away until I'm pretty sure he had NO allies.

Ashur and Mia's relationship continued to burn way too brightly for what amounts to less than half a year. Cinira is awesome though.

The racism and prejudice that Omari or Mia, or the Phoenix refugees, is brushed aside with random moments where Mia proves herself a way too competent person. We're talking Mia basically god-modded through the entire book levels of over competency. It was a growing trend through the other two books though. Mia went from a typical kicking paranormal/Urban fantasy heroine to GOD STATUS pretty darn quick. With only the vaguest hand wave reasoning.

Did you like Jacob? Well. Sorry guys after Mia became officially sort of more than likely in a committed relationship that might have a future with Ashur, Jacob exited stage left. (Mia's constant "that sounded like a future to me...but let's take it slow" thought process was very vexing here)

Many of the secondary characters we knew took far back stage spots with Mia dominating much of the narrative and new to us folk filling in as Mia kept separating from the group for various reasons.

Overall I was dismayed with how the conclusion turned out. It felt rushed, giving the world plot and novel plot little time to stretch out and breathe.
