- Cici and Aggie are allies. Period. There's no mean girl narrative here.

- Aggie's breast size is not used as shorthand for her being a jerk, an airhead, or a "slut". I abhor the popular narrative that breast size somehow determines a person's personality. On the other side of the coin, while Aggie's breasts attract unwanted attention (mostly sexual from boys, jealousy from girls), it is made absolutely clear that this is not her fault; it is all on those other girls and boys. As it should be.

Really, only one thing made my eyebrows crinkle: Cici and Drew's reading choices. Being the avid seventh and eighth grade readers they are, why are they spending their time on 39 Clues and Infinity Ring? Exciting, to be sure, but way too young, IMO. \*judgey mcjudgerson\*
