Now, I feel nervous saying this. But I just...loved it. Maybe because I didn't really know it existed and it was a nice surprise. And maybe because I was in just the right mood. But, mostly because, though not the highest rated nor the most talked about nor the most obvious of her books, it was just a GREAT story! All the best parts of Mary Calmes in a tidy package that had me reading straight through and then going right back and reading it again...and I NEVER do that.

Looking through other ratings, I noticed it's not a slam dunk among her fans. But here's why I loved it:

Boone & Scott are best friends. Like codependent type of friendship (which I love...see "**Take My Picture**"). Like know-each-other-better-than-anyone-else type friendship. Like need-you-to-breathe type friendship. *Love.*

Scott is a chef. *Love.*

Boone is a man with a mysterious past. *Love.*

There's some unintentional jealousy that leads to revelation of feelings. *Love.*

There's some funny bits. *Love.*

There's some sexy bits. *Love.*

Then there's this whole unfolding of Boone's past...*really REALLY love.*

There's a bit of supernatural what-the-heck'ery with a dessert in a mystery cookbook...*didn't think I would but I did love.*

And there you have it...a book that made me suuuuper happy.

Hot damn, this is my favorite Calmes book since *Frog*.

The theme of MAGIC in cooking is perfectly executed. One of the MCs is a chef, and the story takes place in New Orleans, that place of spirits and haunts.

There is a (bitchy except to those she likes) ghost named Florence, traditional Japanese irezumi (a method of tattooing the body by hand), yakuza on the prowl, and two best friends missing the moment.

Boone, an art gallery owner, has loved and lost. Raised in Japan, Boone is a big, burly man, a little scary looking until he smiles.

Boone is the first-person narrator of the story, and it isn't until halfway through that we realize he's not a particularly reliable one.

Scott, the chef, is the light to Boone's growliness. Scott flits from man to man, filling his time.

His latest conquest is Daniel, a rather stuffy doctor, but the chocolate mousse for sorting (recipe courtesy of Granny B, of course!) that Scott prepares has something to say about that.

This story is sweet and very sexy.

Both Scott and Boone get rather possessive. The scene in the kitchen where Boone strips and Scott is all, *Back off, bitches*, is hilarious.

Boone's past with his first love is heartbreak (grab a hankie or two), and I was glad to see he found closure.

And the ending, oh yes, the ending is a FOREVER kind of HEA.

What a lovely conclusion to an all-around awesome series. I liked four out of the five stories.

This was a really great short story. I loved the lady ghost that haunted the apartment, too! And can I just give a shout out to the crawfish and gumbo that were mentioned - because I really couldn't live without either in my diet. And it is now crawfish season, and we've already had 3 family/friend crawfish boils in the past month. There is nothing quite like Louisiana cuisine.

Check this one out. If you're a Calmes addict like me, you'll LOVE it. And if you're not, I still think you will enjoy this one.
