Forced to go to Nottingham by his king, Sir Hugh Corbett, senior clerk in the Royal Chancery and Keeper of the Secret Seal, is charged with uncovering why the legendary Robin Hood, the pardoned outlaw of Sherwood Forest has returned to his criminal ways with a vengeance. Solving a few murders along the way, the outcome of this particular mystery is a surprising one, yet one that has overtones of contemporary socio-political realities.
