This book presented a good lesson that you should not judge someone before you get to know them. All the rumors that stirred up within this book were out of hand and turned out not to be true at all! Bullying always seems to be an issue throughout schooling so it is best to open kids up to it early on. One flaw that I noticed is that the title of the book implies that Butch is a bully so it kind of throws off the reader in a way. Within the book, I liked how the author used figurative language to really demonstrate that Hubie was using his imagination when thinking about the bully. This shows the reader which sort of context figurative language is used in, and how it is often exaggeratory. The illustrations in the book are lively and full of detail so the reader has to take a moment to examine it and notice the fine details. The artist used a softer color pallet and rendered a sketchy looking black outline to create depth and contrast.

Overall, I enjoyed this book and value the lesson it teaches. I would definitely use this book in the classroom in order to promote a positive environment where everyone is kind toward one another. Cute read!
