Everyone that has suffered abuse needs someone in their life willing to go to the mat for them like Jagger did for Tatiana.

Jagger is in his apartment when he hears his landlord fighting with a women, he had to do something to stop it. When he crashes into the apartment and sees Tatianna huddled in a corner with blood on her he cannot stop his rage. Tatiana is so tiny for a seventeen year old it's hard to believe that she is almost eighteen all Jagger can think of is what it was like to be beaten by his father when he was young and defenseless and he cannot let that happen to her.

Tatianna was more than physically abused, she was emotionally abused, and socially withdrawn...she was not permitted to leave their apartment building. No attending school, no friends, NOTHING! This poor girl has no idea what lays behind her apartment door.

Jagger makes it his mission to help get Tatianna out from under her father's thumb, and once that is done he will deal with his attraction to her.

This story was very emotional you witness some of the abuse that is inflicted upon Tatiana but you also witness the love between Jagger and Tatianna as well as his two brothers and their wives. I haven't read Hendrix or Morrison's stories yet but I do plan on going back and reading them.

*due to my excitement over this book, there are potentially spoilers. I've re-read the review and don't believe so, but hid the main part just in case, for those of you who don't want to know!

Jagger was a drop-everything-to-read book. It didn't matter that I had a book due on Monday, let alone 3 more due Tuesday, with a grand total of 10 tour-review books this week (not to mention the other reading commitments). This was a book I had been waiting for so ever-impatiently since finishing Morrison.

And yes, it was everything I wanted and more.

When I read Hendrix, I wanted to follow up with Morrison's book simply because I loved this writing duo and the siblingship they created. I didn't think I could like Morrison any more than I liked his brother -- but I was oh so wrong. And while I knew there wasn't any possible way Jagger could top Morrison (and really, he didn't... Morrison and Hailey and his little little chick are just too freaking cute), I knew that Jagger was going to bring forth his own demons that occurred from the loss of the men's mother and the bastardish ways of their father.

I appreciated that Tatiana was scared of Jagger's fighting -- in her world, beating on another person was done for one reason only. After living that life for eighteen years, that's not something that can be erased, and I felt the authors handled that extremely well, as well as Jagger's response.

Also handled well was the suspense line that is drawn in this story. I found that it allowed Jagger's emotions to be fully exposed for the reader. I did, though, feel that Tatiana's feelings toward Jagger (especially so quickly) could be mistaken for hero-worship, but... sometimes these things can be easily overlooked to a reader, aka this reader.

"Don't you see? You are everything good in this bad, bad world of mine. Hold me back, hold me any way you want to, but please, I beg you, just hold me and don't let go." --Jagger

Additionally, there's a major change in Tatiana's life that one would think she would be ecstatic about, but again, handled incredibly well, her grief comes through. The authors' ability to write these characters' psyches was on-par and completely appropriate for the situations.

My only negative point to this story would be that once Tatiana and Jagger were together, once that magical number eighteen happened, the romance aspect of the story -- the emotion, the growth as a couple -- felt

stagnant; it didn't quite grow or dwindle, it was just there and straight. As a reader, we watched Jagger's emotion grow the months leading up to her turning eighteen, and we watch his possessiveness, as well as protectiveness (the best part...) play a part but I just felt that a little something more was missing.

But... like that hero-worship thought, this was something that didn't really bother me. It was actually only something I thought about in hindsight, while reflecting on the story. I found Jagger to be an excellent conclusion to the story (and I still loved the overlap from the other books, seeing scenes in Jagger's and Totty's eyes), and found Baby Caldwell to have just as much emotional capacity as his brothers. These men certainly lived the way their mother wanted them to, and with that, her legacy lives. (hide spoiler)]

This is going to be a real short review because I just cannot believe I wasted my time reading this book. And to think *I* was the one who requested it because I liked the blurb.

Alright, so I really wanted to like this book but the whole thing went downhill for me as soon as I started the prologue.

Why?

The prologue was a scene from book one when Jagger just beat the hell out of his landlord because he was beating his 17 years old daughter.

In what world do you think is okay for a barely 18 years old abused girl to be in a very sexual relationship?

This girl has spent her whole life locked in an apartment, emotionally and physically abused by her father and threatened to be sent back to Russia, a place she hasn't been she was a baby. She's never known a gentle touch, she's never had new clothes or presents or decent human contact whatsoever so it's obvious that she's going to be pretty attached to the first person who treats her well.

The amount of insta-crap in this book blew my mind.

Through the book I found myself more and more uncomfortable and all those come backs about Tatiana being "legal" and "a woman with a period" just fucked me up. I couldn't.

Dude, if you have to continually make clear that your character is legal and shit, then something is wrong about it and you know it.

Jagger was an asshole. Everyone in this series seem to be a) an asshole, b) an abuser or c) a Mary Sue.

I honestly do not recommend this series to anyone.

This is one of those books where curiosity got the better of me and I resisted my instincts to DNF and went on. It was, unfortunately not redeemed. Since I finished it, I feel I owe it a review. Jagger and Tatiana informally start this relationship in a non sexual way when Jagger busts in the door as her dad is beating her up and kicks his @\$\$\$. Go Jagger! He watches out for her in ways he can from afar. Things happen and Tatiana, a few days shy of 18, ends up leaving home. Where she initially ends up is interesting and added a twist to the story, especially considering what she learns from the person. She forms a tentative friendship with someone Jagger has issues with and that person forms some romantic interest in her partly to bother Jagger, partly because they may be genuine. The plot seems to imply focus on Tatiana's recovery but imo it really doesn't. She doesn't get help for herself. She doesn't learn to cope or become independent. This was a severely abused girl. Unfortunately, although Totty grew up fast due to the abuse she was innocent in many ways and didn't experience anything before getting into a relationship with Jagger. The age thing bothers some people but I'm ok with it when the girl is mature. I married at 17 and 16 years later we are still together. In Tatiana's case I feel she and Jagger should've waited. Their first time together I found to be almost appalling. I couldn't fathom that Jagger would think that was ok. There were a lot of red flags for me here so I could not enjoy it. I will say that we all have different tastes and I really enjoyed Morrison by the same authors so it's not that. If you don't want to ruin that feeling and enjoyed the other books I might suggest passing on this one. Safety: No OW though H slept with another fighter's girl in the past and had to "stop himself from falling in love with her". OW was abused as well. No OM but heroine has an admirer. No sharing. They wear condoms. No pushing away. h was virgin. Severe physical abuse. No rape.
