I really enjoyed this book. I'm not much into romance, but I really REALLY enjoyed a prior "Quilts of Love series" book, as it wasn't 100% romance and more real life with romance woven through it. So I decided if that one was good, then I had to get them ALL. Kind of like Pokemon. ;)

This one did not disappoint. It started off with a bang. Well, with a "beep". The "beep" of a hospital heart monitor. Our MC went through some very traumatic things and both God and the handsome detective in charge of her case helped her to get through it. But neither the handsome detective, nor God overshadowed what the MC had gone through. She was physically, mentally and emotionally in pain. But she has support, not just God's and a man's, but a female friend and a new-found family member.

The characters are complex, like real people are. They have moments of weakness and moments of strength and love. They cry, they laugh and this reader admits, she got a bit teary eyed herself when reading the book.

I really liked the glimpse into the life of a ballerina, though the Russian trope of ballerina and mobster seemed a bit...shopworn. It seemed a bit stereotyped to me, but it didn't take me out of the story too much.

What did take me out was a continuity error at 31% of the way into the book. I have an eARC, so maybe it didn't make it into the final version. I hope not, it COMPLETELY took me out of the story and gave the book a less than final polished feel.

Other than that, no major complaints with this book. I would definitely recommend it to those who enjoy suspense with their romance and aren't turned off by God being a main character in their books. The ending was a bit over the top, but it made sense for the story. A solid four star book.

Robin Carroll's name is synonymous with Christian suspense and if you have ever read any of her novels you know just what I mean. For those of you that haven't and love a great novel that literally will keep you on the edge of your seat waiting for the next proverbial shoe to drop, you might want to check her out. She is also the latest author contributing her writing talents to the Quilts of Love Series, in her addition, Hidden in the Stars. Even though these are all part of an ongoing series, they are truly stand alone novels and can be read in any order, but what a way of introducing readers into the talented writing styles of some great Christian authors.

Hidden in the Stars involves Sophia Montgomery, an upcoming new Olympic gymnast who has finally taken all her hard work and is on her way to the Olympics. At least she was until two men showed up at her home with what looked like a home invasion, and began to assault her and her mother Nina, speaking in Russian. Knowing enough Russian, she had the basic understanding that the men wanted something from her mother and would not leave until they got it. What she didn't plan on, was that they would stop at NOTHING to get it, even torturing her daughter Sophie, first with crushing her hands, and then choking her to the point of dying.

All Sophie knows when she wakes up is she can't talk, her hands are badly damaged and bandaged and she is facing a detective who has a load of questions for her to answer. But how will she be able to convey what she saw if she can't speak or write? Detective Julian Fraiser knows that the person he is looking at in the hospital bed is more than lucky to be alive. He has seen car accident victims look less beat up and still die. He isn't sure just how much time he has, but he knows this, he will do whatever it takes to find out who did this to Sophie and why!

I received Hidden in the Stars by Robin Carroll compliments of Abingdon Press and Litfuse Publicity for my honest review. This is such an intense novel because there is that unknown element of wondering just what the men wanted who brutally assaulted Sophie and her mother and what is the meaning behind the Russian language that was spoken. You are turning pages as fast as you can read in an effort to know what will happen. Like all great suspense stories, if you can twist the plotline enough to keep the reader engaged but not so lost they give up, but still leave them surprised at the end, I believe you have succeeded as a suspense author and Robin Carroll clearly has done that in this novel. This is the 21st novel in the Quilts of Love series and includes a Reader Discussion Guide at the conclusion. Well worth 4.5 out of 5 stars in my opinion. You also get a sneak peek at Quilted for Christmas, the next novel in the series coming soon.

I really wasn't sure what to expect when I started reading *Hidden In The Stars*, I could tell there would be romance, some murder mystery, and all the other little things that make books worth reading. I'm not even really sure what I found, some information on quilts, on ballerinas, and about how a relationship with God can make everything at least slightly better. But I think the main thing I found was a good book worth reading.

Hidden In The Stars is about an Olympic team gymnast loses her ability with her hands and loses her voice, after watching her mother be killed by strange men looking for something her mother wouldn't give up. Now Sophia finds herself in the hospital her career is now nonexistent, her mother dead and her dead grandma is suddenly alive and well. It's no secret that I am not a religious person at all. So your first thought is probably going to be well she probably didn't like it because God is a focal point of the story. However, I think the religious aspect gave the story its backbone.

I imagine that this book was not written in the moment like so many authors do. The way it reads is like unfolding perfectly neat paper bit-by-bit. Each moment bleeds into the next there's not a whole lot of fat to be read in this, it's all plot driven. Which is one of the reasons I liked this novel.

I feel that there was a lack of characterization in this novel on Sophia, all we really learned was that she was upset with her situation or rather devastated, and she was going to be on the Olympic Team right before the attack. We have no idea about what else she likes to do, if she reads, watched TV. I just would've liked more insight on her, because she's basically a victim with determination not to be a victim. So I can't even be sure if I like her as a character. Which is ironic because at one point in the novel she complained that her grandmother had no personal information on her mother other then she was a ballerina, and yet all we get from Sophia is that she's a gymnast.

There was also a lack of characterization on everyone else, except grandma.

I liked the way the past met the present in this novel. Old acquaintances come to light in a dastardly light. Former lovers come to take their vengeance. Just trust me when I say everyone mentioned will be tied together in a nice little knot.
