Really brilliant book.

At first, I thought differently. Since I already know most of the stories, I found them to be fairly obvious, but that would not be true for someone not completely familiar with them. But what really got me were the commentaries in the subsequent chapters. So I skipped the retellings of the stories I know well and focused on the commentary. But the two stories from Judges that I wasn't as familiar with were expertly told and engaging.

At times, Kirsch strains credulity with some of his hypotheses, but not nearly as much as many of the rabbis and sages and scholars he quotes, some of whose generally accepted beliefs are astonishing in their wilful blindness to the plain facts evident in the text. And as Kirsch points out, midrash is an ancient and honorable practice, to which he is merely contributing.

The book is a fascinating read, and its message is very important in our age of dogmatic fundamentalism, which a clear-eyed reading of the Bible as a whole simply cannot support, as this book effectively proves. Bravo, Mr.Kirsch!

Forbidden Tales is worth reading if you are familiar enough with the Bible to know when you are being mislead and discerning enough to take away from it what few diamonds you can; at the very least, it is entertaining, easy reading. Although Kirch makes some good points and tells some interesting stories, at times his scholarship appears somewhat sloppy and his thesis somewhat suspect.

Kirsch explores those tales of the Bible that do not generally make it into the sermon illustrations of the average pastor. He deals with the incest of Lot's daughters, the rape of Dinah, the prostitution of Tamar, Jephthah's sacrifice of his daughter, and other such tales. The author's theme is that these stories have been "censored" and "suppressed" over the centuries. He suggests that the tales, as we have them, are but a shadow of the underlying forbidden story suppressed by the authors of the Bible, who (Kirsch believes) reformulated these much older tales into something less shocking. Kirsch's idea that the biblical authors somehow suppressed the true stories seems ill-conceived. As the author himself points out, these tales are shocking enough as is.

One example of Kirsch's idea of a "forbidden tale" is his speculation that the sacrifice of Jephthah's daughter is a sterilization of a story "so shocking to the biblical authors that they dressed up her death in the trappings of sacrifice but dared not speak her name at all." This "so shocking" story, according to Kirsch, is that Jephthah's daughter was in reality part of a fertility cult that worshiped a goddess and that she was killed as punishment. The problem with this (rather wild) speculation is that nowhere else in the Bible is Jewish involvement with fertility cults or other gods "hushed up." The pages of the Old Testament elsewhere speaks of idolatrous cult worship and capital punishment for idolatry. Why would such a story, then, need to be "hushed up" in the Book of Judges? Indeed, the tale, as it stands, is a far greater shocker than Kirsch's supposedly "censored" version.

I really like the way Kirsch has fleshed out the stories that he is looking at in this book. The Bible doesn't waste any time looking at the emotional impact of anything, nor on the reasons people do what they do. Kirsch has done an excellent job of making sense of certain completely nonsensical texts. He does a fine job, as well, of setting the context. And he shows how the "God" that is portrayed throughout the Bible is very clearly a construct of the authors.
