Dr Tenace is a dreamlike but sharp-edged story that will plant incredibly strong visual images in your mind.

The main character, James Tenace, is a scientist and doctor passionate about death and consciousness.

Passionate to the point of devoting his life to researching the connection.

The book intertwines Tenace's own life with the lives (or deaths-in-life) of people in comas that he "cares for" in his hospital. Mostly he studies them, fascinated as he is with souls and minds. He is not only a genius, but also an inventive, engineering type – think Dr. Frankenstein. He's a bit creepy, but as you enter his world deeper and deeper and learn the sources of his pain, you feel pity for him, appreciation of his quirky humor and awe for his daring and TENACITY.

His goal is to bring patients out of comas, and why not, out of death. A scary concept to other people, including his enemies, of which he has quite a few, thanks to his indifference and real intelligence. Dr Tenace's discoveries could transform the world of mental illness, bringing methods of healing. But it's all too fantastic for the close-minded, jealous characters he's surrounded with.

The novel flows logically from him getting *The Idea* to bringing it into reality and applying it, with several forays into his own past that nicely round out his character. Some of the scenes are funny, others shocking, some truly harrowing, and others will always stick in my mind: the snowstorm, the accident and Tenace running through the forest...you'll see. You find yourself rooting for him by the end, which is a totally unexpected ending, suspenseful, but somehow inevitable.

The writing style is curious: esoteric but realistic, with lots of scientific jargon, hard numbers and great techno-imagery. But the reader also hears Dr Tenace's mind at work, exploring his feelings or the effects of his words on other people, conjecturing or wistfully hoping.

Here's a writing example taken at random:

“Tenace was mad with joy! No one had ever rejoiced so much at the event of death. 1253.76 seconds lay somewhere between the cessation of activity of the heart and a drop of 10 Db of the average electroencephalography activity. Something extremely powerful had happened there, that the number-crunching program had found out. Tenace was proud of his insight. He had intuited that, before performing autocorrelation on the signal field; he had to combine them through a neural network back-looped on the autocorrelation. Of course, such abstract mathematics was Chinese to most people, including many scientists and mathematicians, so Tenace did not bother to explain to Sister Mortimer what was going through his mind at this time. He just enjoyed the intellectual orgasm he was having and happily noticed that it was spreading all the way down to his feet, tickling his breast and ribs like a good slice of lamb with mint sauce going down with a sip of a ten-year-old Bordeaux.”
