Whatever the cause, it is unfortunately going to be passed over by readers who might actually enjoy it as openly as I did.

It's contemporary. It intelligently connects to the audience through relatable emotion and sound tracking. The author apparently has good taste in music and knows how to transport a reader personally through time.

The characters are well formed and likeable. Although a cynical, possibly depressed main has the potential to put a reader off side (especially if they opened the cover hoping for 'chick-lit'), I found him fairly easy to live with in my life.

His struggles with normality and para-normality led to his questioning of, well, just about all of his life when and where it might be guessed that he would. However, I found him neither transparent nor predictable.

Human personalities have tiresome aspects, yes. Adams' view in this novel is that these may very well continue after death. Her story, unlike the not-so-admirable bits of personalities explored within the book, I found quite refreshing.

If you enjoy books in the vein of Zigzag Street (Nick Earls), you'll more than likely finish this book smiling.
