And as anyone can see, when Daddy is on one side and Mama on the other, with Leon in the middle, there's no room for anyone else. 'We can't put a baby penguin anywhere ...?' Leon says. Is there a place that's just right for a little brother penguin to go?

In this endearing and cozy picture book, author and illustrator Émile Jadoul poignantly captures the worries and evolving feelings that arise when a new baby enters the family of a young child. The sweet story is told with sensitivity and gentle humor from the child's perspective, allowing young readers' understanding to grow along with Leon's, as he eventually figures out where and how a new sibling will fit into his family. The uncomplicated artwork is charming and expressive and a perfect complement to the limited text, conveying simply and realistically the emotions of the story. This book would make a wonderful starting point for a conversation about becoming a new big brother or sister, a common experience for preschoolers and kindergartners. A cozy read-aloud, it also lends itself to exploring growing up or family life, or a character education lesson on adaptability.

A warm story, just perfect for an only child/older sibling who is experiencing a new baby in the family. While the concept is not new, the story about this young penguin is told with a fresh tenderness and shows a happy resolution for him (which may/may not be the case in real life!). Artwork is done in black pencil crayons and oil, with a very limited color palette of black, white, and green with touches of pink (in rosy circle cheeks), yellow (beaks), and other colors here and there. Makes you just want to pinch one of those cute cheeks!

If your books about bringing home the new baby to your baby are worn, this will be a pleasant replacement suggestion.

This charming book is translated from French. I haven't read the rest in this series, but I am completely charmed by this one.

Leon, a young penguin, has a new baby in his house. He is very worried about how the new baby will fit in the house and family. His mother only has room for him on her lap. His father's shoulders are much too high for a baby. Leon fits perfectly between his mother and his father, so how can they accommodate a newborn? When baby Marcel cries, Leon figures out where his baby brother fits best.

I am delighted by the simple illustrations. This is a story that will appeal to children facing the same predicament as Leon, and their parents will enjoy it also.
