It is a much newer story than the ones I read and rather than a sketch of the characters there is an actual picture/drawing.

Nancy is still a teenager and living at home solving mysteries. This mystery comes as a result of a story in a magazine contest.

The contest asks its readers to solve a mystery about a young man who lived in the 19th century in Belgium who received a pair of lace cuffs that had a message hidden in them. He disappeared without a trace along with a considerable fortune.

Nancy and her friends Bess and George travel to Belgium to visit a friend of Bess's mother who has found an antique cross and part of a letter written long ago that refers to a treasure.

When they arrive in Belgium Nancy's suitcase is stolen and a man dressed as a ghost appears in the basement of the house. It turns out that the young man who disappeared lived in the house long ago.

The cross is stolen from the house one night while everyone is out.

The girls meet the great grandson of the young man and they discover the hiding place of the lace cuffs and the fortune which turns out to be jewelry.

This was my first time reading one of the ever-so-famous Nancy Drew books, and I had high expectations. I love solving mysteries, and I think this was a great place to start for my EDCI 304 course regarding literacy in upper elementary students. My initial responses while reading this book included a mixture of disappointment followed by curiosity. I found it disappointing in the sense that so many things kept going wrong for Nancy Drew. Recognized as an amateur detective, Nancy Drew enters a magazine contest to solve a mystery about the disappearance of a wealthy man, his lace cuffs, and his treasure; but when she realizes this mystery presents opportunity for her to solve it in real life, she faces more than just one mystery. From burglaries and threats, to hidden passageways and messages, Nancy Drew and her friends search for answers, crossing dangerous paths.

From a teaching perspective, this book offers many opportunities to engage in learning. As I was reading, I saw some immediate opportunities to discuss characteristics of the mystery genre and analyzing text features. In this particular book, the titles of each chapter foreshadow important events and allow the reader to make predictions. Students can also create their own mystery books. As a teacher, I could create a scavenger hunt for the students to read and process the clues in order to find the end prize. Another option would be to post a word wall in the classroom, emphasizing important words within the book. These words could include (but not limited to): sleuth, plagiarism, and kantwerker.

Because I have read relatively few mystery books, my recommendations for future readings may be limited. However, I would suggest taking a look into books by Agatha Christie. She's a fantastic author and writes wonderful mystery novels.
