This is the first in a series of books featuring Isabel and Hugh Croft, and is set on the Island of Garansay, which in reality is the Isle of Arran. Isabel has returned there following the death of her mother, and stumbles upon a case that has similarities to one that happened 40 years earlier on the same island. The story is well plotted, although there are a few red herrings, which will keep you guessing right through to the end. If the remainder of the series is as good as this one, then the author may well be worth looking out for in the future.

This book appealed to me because of its setting, but I quickly found it irritating with its present tense first person narrative, and the narrator is cold and prim and lacking much emotion or humour. She reports emotion, but somehow the prose is flat. I kept waiting for some kind of explanation as to why she was like this, hoping it was some part of the plot. I'm a little anxious about the portrayal of Scotland as the kind of place you see fights in pubs all the time – depends on your lifestyle, really – but in general she seems to find it hard to draw the line between what she as the author knows about Scotland and what she as the narrator is finding out – she wants to find out more about Glasgow between the wars, for example, but already seems to know all about art depicting the period and where to find it. Her informants lecture her without much humanity, as if they are reading from a book. There are odd capital letters ('underground Station', for example) and some poor laying out of paragraphs. The denouement was interesting, and the pace certainly quickened towards the end, but I found the final explanation a little too convoluted. I might read another book by this author but I did not find the main character at all appealing.
