This book was good but it needed another serious editing pass. Aside from the tense and homonym issues I mentioned in my earlier updates, there were also several instances of pluralization issues (ex: parent's instead of parents). The apostrophe s signifies ownership, not a plural person/object/thing. Finally, this is technically considered a personal preference issue now, but when it comes to small numbers (1-10), it is generally accepted that the number should be written out (one, two, etc.). What drew me to this story was a young man who starts working at his local library and then finds himself in the middle of some supernatural forces. That part of the story was fairly interesting. At one point the characters travel from New Haven, North Carolina, to New Orleans, and it is stated by our narrator Max that even though they are thousands of miles from home, he still has to train. Well, I did a quick search and it's hundreds of miles, not thousands; that would be more of an East Coast to West Coast distance. So while this book read fairly quickly and was fairly interesting, the numerous errors dragged my rating down considerably. I'll still probably check out the next book, and hopefully some of the editing issues will be solved by then.
